JUNIOR NORMAL STARTS WELL

Increased Attendance and Good Work Commenced Under Favorable Circumstances

The annual session of the Alliance State Junior Normal opened Monday of this week, with Supt. Earl M. Cline of Geneva in charge as principal, assisted by an able corps of instructors. The first week is devoted to county institute work, but does not interfere with the program of work for the entire Junior Normal session.

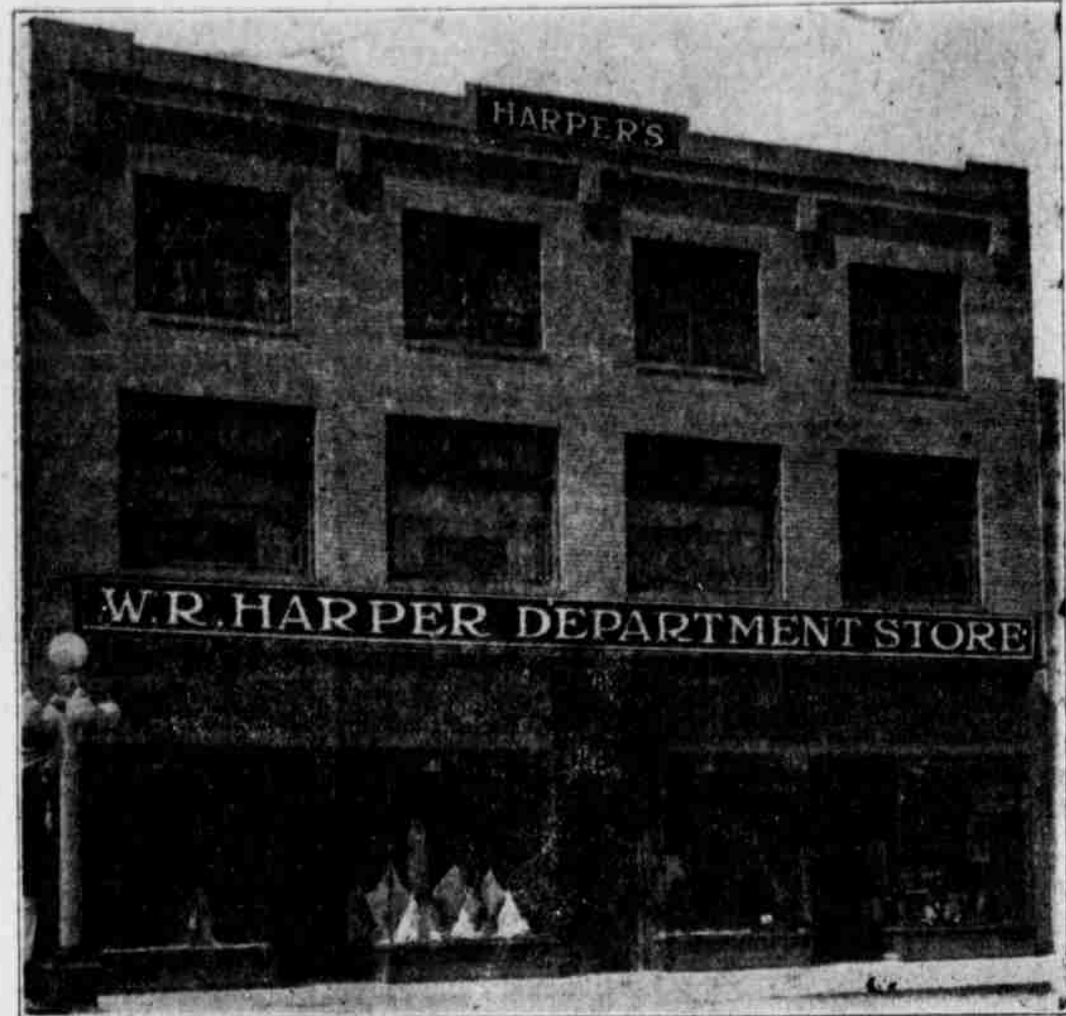
The attendance is good, considerably better than last year. Already about ten more are enrolled than were in attendance in 1913, and enough more are expected to bring the increase up to twenty-five or thirty. The enrollment to date is 103. Twenty of those enrolled are for institute week only.

The lectures by Prof. Pugsley of the State University on different phases of agricultural education were an interesting feature of this week's work. Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons he addressed the students of the Junior Normal, and in the evening of each day gave a public lecture illustrated with stereop-
