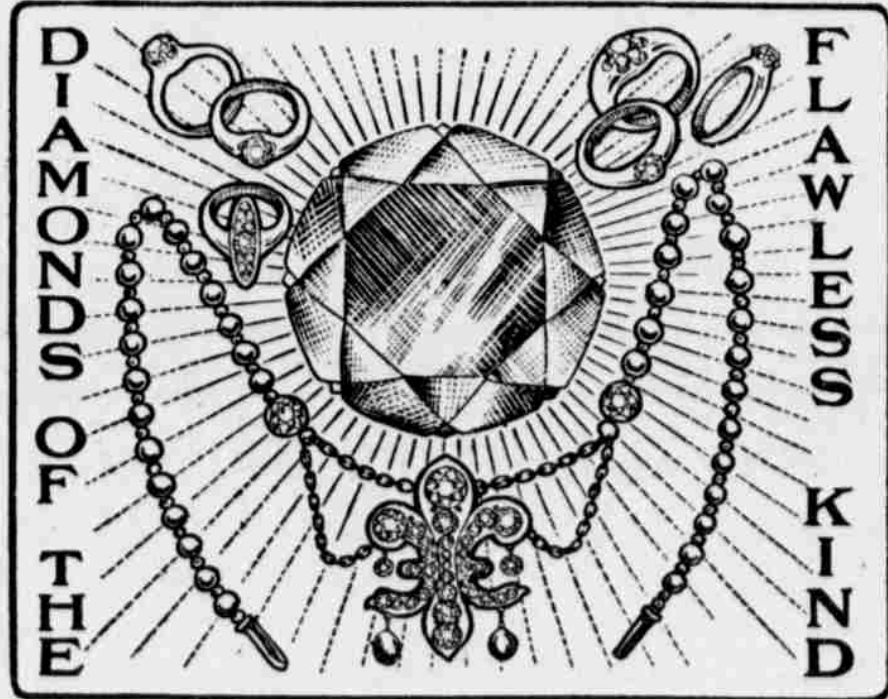

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. TWO.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 3rd, A. D. 1914.

"A Joint Resolution to amend Section six (6) of Article one (1) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, to read as follows: Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section six (6) of Article one (1) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 6. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, but in all civil cases and in criminal cases less than felonies, five-sixths of the jury may render a verdict and the Legislature may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in courts inferior to the district court.

Sec. 2. That at the general election for state and legislative officers to be held in the State of Nebraska on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1914, there shall be printed upon the ballot of each elector for his approval or rejection of the above and foregoing amendment in the following form: Proposed amendment to the constitution providing that in all civil cases and in criminal cases less than felonies, five-sixths of the jury may render a verdict, and "Against the proposed amendment to the Constitution provided that in all civil cases and in criminal cases less than felonies, five-sixths of the jury may render a verdict."

Approved, April 1, 1913.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. THREE.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 3rd, A. D. 1914.

"A Joint resolution proposing amendments to Section 1, of Article V, and Section 24, of Article V, of the Constitution of Nebraska, relating to term of office and salary of Governor and other executive officers. Be it Resolved and Enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That the executive department shall consist of a Governor, who shall hold his office for a term of two years from the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January next after his election, and until his successor is elected and qualified. In addition to the Governor, the executive department shall include the following officers: Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney General, and Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings, each of whom shall hold his office for the term of two years from the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, next after his election, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Provided, however, that the term of office of said officers shall be held on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1914, and each succeeding election shall be held at the same relative time in each year thereafter. The Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, and Treasurer shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep the public records, books and papers there, and shall perform such duties as may be required by law.

Sec. 24. The salary of the Governor shall be five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars per annum. The salaries of Auditor of Public Accounts and Secretary of State, Superintendent of Public Instruction and Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings shall be two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars each per annum, and of the Attorney General, four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) per annum, the salary of the State Treasurer shall be three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor shall receive one and one-half the compensation of a senator, and after the adoption of this constitution they shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs, interests upon public moneys in their hands, or under their control, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law for services performed by an officer provided for in this article of the constitution shall be paid in advance into the state treasury. There shall be no allowance for clerk hire in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and Attorney General.

Sec. 2. That at said election on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November, 1914, on the ballot of each elector voting thereat, there shall be printed or written the words: "For proposed amendments to the constitution fixing the term of office and salary for governor, and other executive officers," and "Against proposed amendments to the constitution fixing the term of office and salary for governor, and other executive officers."

Approved, April 21, 1913.

LONE SURVIVOR LEFT HOSPITAL

James Trainer, of Medicine Hat, Canada, Leaves Hospital for Short Stay on Ranch

James Trainer, of Medicine Hat, Canada, the only survivor of the railroad accident at Hemingford on Tuesday, August 11, in which his three companions were killed and he was seriously injured, left the hospital Saturday morning and went down into the sandhills for a stay of two weeks on a ranch, where he hopes to recover his health.

Trainer's left arm, which was shattered when he was struck by the engine which killed the other three men, is still stiff and has two plates fastened to the bone. He expects to re-enter the hospital when he returns from the ranch and have the plates removed. Trainer is thankful that he still lives, considering the fact that the others were all killed. The other men were sleeping on a bed of warm cinders between the rails at the Hemingford water tank and were struck by train No. 42, which does not stop there. Trainer was sleeping outside the rails and owed his life to this fact. The men killed were Orion Straudman, Nevada, Missouri; William Peters of Goodhue, Nebraska; and Gus A. Steinbring, of Scotland, South Dakota.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. ONE.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 3rd, A. D. 1914.

"A Joint resolution to amend section 1 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relating to revenue. Be it Resolved and Enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. The rules of taxation shall be uniform as to any given class and taxes shall be levied upon such property as the Legislature shall prescribe. Taxes may also be imposed on incomes, privileges and occupations, which taxes may be graduated and progressive and reasonable exemptions may be provided, in addition to those hereinafter specifically mentioned in section 2 of this article.

Sec. 2. That at the general election in November, 1914, there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution in the following form: "For amendment to the Constitution providing for uniform and progressive taxation" and "Against said proposed amendment to the Constitution providing for uniform and progressive taxation."

Approved, March 27, 1913.
