DECISION FOR DEMONSTRATOR

Box Butte County Farm Management Association Organized at Enthusiastic Meeting

The disposition among the enterprising farmers of Box Butte county to get together and co-operate for their mutual welfare augurs well for the development and upbuilding of the agricultural interests of this country. A meeting of enthusiastic farmers was held in the Alliance city hall last Saturday, as announced in the last issue of The Herald. L. J. Schill presided. He had been previously elected to act as chairman until an organization had been completed.

Prof. A. E. Anderson, in charge of farm demonstration work of the Nebraska State Agricultural College, gave a good talk, explaining briefly the scope of the work done by farm demonstrators in other Nebraska counties, and making some practical suggestions for this county. Following Mr. Anderson's address, Dr. C. E. Fisher of Sterling, Colo., who was in the city visiting his nephew, W. D. Fisher, was asked to tell something about farm demonstration work in Logan county, Colo., where he has farming interests. He responded with a very interesting talk in which he told of their farm organization and the benefits that had been already derived from having a farm demonstrator during the past two years.

Reports from committeemen, who had been appointed to ascertain the feasibility of organizing a county farm management association, were received. These reports were almost without exception favorable. On motion the Box Butte County Farm Management Association was organized by electing L. J. Schill temporary president and Art Grove temporary secretary. The next meeting of the association will be held in the city hall at Alliance, at 2 p. m., Saturday, Nov. 21. A full attendance of all members is desired as important business is to be transacted. Farmers who have not yet joined are invited to be present and learn about the work that is proposed to be done.

Secretary W. D. Fisher of the Alliance Commercial Club is endeavoring to have the farm demonstrator from Logan county, Colo., and also from Merrick county, Nebr., present and give first-hand information as to what has been accomplished in their respective counties. If they come, they will probably remain several days, as farmers in different parts of Box Butte county have requested that meetings be held in their neighborhoods, and an effort will be made to have the demonstrators address these meetings.

Only farmers or persons who are directly interested in farming are eligible to membership in the farm management association, but because of the bearing agricultural development will have upon business in general, business men very naturally and properly are interested in the success of the work. It will be observed that Secretary Fisher of the Alliance Commercial Club and Secretary C. O. Rosenberger of the Hemingford Commercial Club are doing what they can to help along the good cause.

Farmers joining the association are required to subscribe not less than five dollars per year for two years, to assist in paying a farm demonstrator and other expenses. Following is a list of members up to Wednesday, November 18, with the annual subscription of each:

NOTICE TO AUTO OWNERS

Mayor Rodgers Gives Notice to Those Who Have Been Disobeying Auto Ordinances

TO AUTO OWNERS:
The police have turned in over thirty names, in the last few days, of those who are daily disobeying the Auto Ordinance.

Most of these have turned their cars in the middle of the block, or left their cars standing wrong way on the streets, or driving on left side of street. Quite a number are driving at a greater speed than twelve miles per hour. Now is the time to call a halt, and hereafter those disobeying this ordinance will have to answer in Police Court.

Remember that driving at a greater speed than twelve miles per hour covers all streets in the City, but leaving your car turned wrong way or turning within the block, or driving on left side of street, covers Box Butte Avenue from Railroad street to Fifth street.

During a fire, or when a fire alarm is called, all drivers are requested to give the middle of the street, by driving near the curb, so that the Fire Truck can pass in safety.

DEATH FROM TYPHOID FEVER

Theodore Bayer Passes Away after Two Weeks' Illness with the Dread Disease

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Bayer was darkened by the presence of the death angel early Sunday morning, their twelve year old son, "Teddy," being called away. He was taken sick with typhoid fever about three weeks prior to the time of his demise. On the second day of his illness he became unconscious and remained in that condition until life had ebbed away. Everything that could be done by skilled physician and careful nursing failed to restore the loved one to health. He was marked for the tomb.

Theodore Bayer was born February 8, 1903; died November 15, 1914. The funeral service was held in Holy Rosary Catholic church, at 9:30 a. m., on Monday following his death. Rev. Fr. Donnelly, the pastor, said mass and delivered the funeral sermon. Interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Besides his parents, the other members of the family are two brothers, John and Leo, and a sister, Lucille. His parents both have typhoid fever and could not attend the funeral, but both are now improving. A sister of Mrs. Bayer, Mrs. Vondarke of Sioux City, Iowa, arrived Monday in time to attend the funeral.

It weighs approximately 2,200 pounds, four cylinder motor, cone clutch, self starter, electric lights, high tension magneto, floating feed gasoline system, full floating rear axle, 110 inch wheelbase, and full equipment. The car will be sold in Alliance by Lowry & Henry.

BEST LIGHTED CITY IN WEST
New Lighting System for Residence Districts of Alliance Installed and Now in Use

The system of cluster lights on Box Butte avenue and Third street has been the pride of Alliance citizens and the admiration of visitors since being installed, but the street lights in the residence portions of the city were too dim to arouse either pride or admiration. People of the town wanted to show the business portion of the city by night and the residence districts by daylight. It's different now. Since the "juice" has been turned into the new lighting system, the installation of which was completed yesterday, both residence and business sections show up to good advantage, either day or night. Mayor A. D. Rodgers declares that Alliance is now the best lighted city in the state.

At each street intersection, except in the business section, a 60 c. p. Mazda is suspended, taking the place of two 16 c. p. incandescents formerly used. Although the new lamps are not as powerful as are lights, it is expected that they will give better satisfaction, as they are placed only one block apart instead of two, as is usually the case with are lights.
