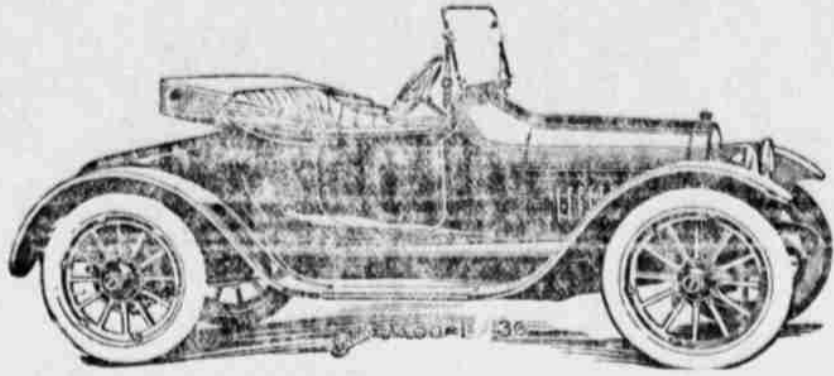

Grass Cattle Higher and Few Corn Feds on Sale.

HOGS UNEVEN, NEARLY DIME.

No Important Change in the Sheep Market—No Good. Stuff Available and Not Much Doing Until Late. Feeder Sheep a Shade Higher.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Nov. 17—A moderate run of cattle showed up yesterday, about 4,200 head. In view of the very unsatisfactory condition of the market for corn-fed cattle last week, it is not at all surprising that there were scarcely any corn-fed on sale yesterday. What few were here met with a ready sale at prices strong to as much as 10¢ to 15¢ higher than last week. There was also an active trade in grass beefs and prices were anywhere from strong to 10¢ to 15¢ higher. Cows and heifers sold a little more freely than last week, but prices were not materially stronger, and the same was true as to stock cattle and feeding steers. The situation is still very much unsettled and prices decidedly irregular, but prospects are favorable for some relief before the week is out.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice yearlings, \$9.50@10.50; good to choice heaves, \$8.75@10.00; fair to good heaves, \$8.00@8.50; common to fair heaves, \$6.75@7.75; good to choice heifers, \$6.50@7.50; good to choice cows, \$5.75@6.75; fair to good cows, \$5.25@5.75; canners and cutters, \$4.50@5.25; veal calves, \$7.75@10.25; bulls, stags, etc., \$4.75@6.75; choice to prime beefs, \$8.00@8.50; good to choice range beefs, \$7.40@8.00; fair to good range beefs, \$6.75@7.35; common to fair beefs, \$6.00@6.75; stock heifers, \$4.75@6.25; stock cows, \$4.50@5.50; stock calves, \$6.00@8.00; good to choice feeders, \$7.20@7.85; fair to good feeders, \$6.50@7.10; common to fair feeders, \$5.80@6.40.

Some 5,000 hogs showed up in the receipts yesterday. Trade was quiet, with prices nearly a dime higher than the close of last week. Shippers bought some hogs that were fully 10¢ to as much as 15¢ higher. Bulk of the supply went at \$7.70@7.90, and tops reached \$8.05.

About 9,000 sheep and lambs arrived yesterday. There were no new or important changes from the close of last week, with the exception that receipts were light and nothing good was on sale. Owing to the absence of anything good in the killing line, trade dragged along most of the forenoon. There were not enough aged sheep here to make a market. Some wheat-fed lambs from Idaho brought \$8.80. Feeders sold readily at prices a shade higher.
