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LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Native Beef Market Steady to a Dime Lower.

HOG RECEIPTS LARGER--25 OFF

Good Trade in Lambs and Prices Steady to a Shade Higher—Market Fairly Active—Slaughter Fully Steady—No receipts on hand.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Dec. 1.—A very good run of cattle arrived yesterday, about 5,600 head. Demand from dressed beef men for corned cattle was not at all urgent and prices ranged from steady to a dime lower than last week. Anything desirable in the way of grass cattle found a tolerably ready sale at fully steady prices, \$8.00 being paid for very good stock. Common and Texas were in very good demand and ruled steady to strong at \$5.75@6.75. Cows and heifers were in the usual fair demand and quotably unchanged as compared with last week. Stockers and feeders were in active request and about 10¢ higher all around.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice beefs, \$8.75@9.75; fair to good beefs, \$7.75@8.50; common to fair beefs, \$6.50@7.50; good to choice heifers, \$6.50@7.25; good to choice cows, \$5.75@6.75; fair to good cows, \$5.25@5.75; canners and cutters, \$4.50@5.25; veal calves, \$8.00@10.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.00@7.00; good to choice feeders, \$7.25@7.75; fair to good feeders, \$6.50@7.25; common to fair feeders, \$5.50@6.25; stock heifers, \$4.75@6.25; stock cows, \$4.50@5.50; stock calves, \$6.50@8.25; good to choice range beefs, \$8.00@8.50; fair to good range beefs, \$7.40@7.80; common to fair beefs, \$6.25@7.25.

A large run of hogs showed up yesterday, over 13,600 head. This is an account of the western Iowa quarantine being lifted. The market was thrown clear out of balance by the large run, the packers pounding values unmercifully. The general market is about 25¢ lower than the close of last week. Bulk of the sales moved at 30¢ below last Saturday's high price, \$7.15@7.20, with a top of \$7.30. Just

Sheep and lamb receipts totaled 13,000 head. The demand seemed very fair for killing lambs and prices were steady to a shade higher. A bunch of Colorado fed lambs touched the \$9.15 mark. The range on the bulk of all sales was anywhere from \$8.50 to \$9.00. Trade in aged sheep was more or less limited on account of a moderate supply on hand. Fat ewes had a spread of \$4.50 to \$5.00, prices being fully steady. Yearlings brought \$6.75. There were no feeders of consequence here.
