

LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Cattle Break 15 to 25 Cents on Heavy Receipts.

HOGS STEADY TO NICKEL UP.

Sheep Trade Dull and Weak to 10@15c Lower—Buyers Are Extremely Baulish—Messages From Eastern Points Very Discouraging.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Dec. 15.—A very liberal run of cattle arrived yesterday, about 8,800 head. Unexpectedly heavy receipts of cattle at all points had a most depressing influence on the market, and prices for corn-fed cattle were all of 15@25c lower than Friday right from the start. Trade was very slow throughout. Anything that suited dressed beef men in the way of grass beefs sold at pretty close to steady figures, but low grade and off quality stuff was very slow sale and generally quite a little lower. Cows and heifers were pretty close to a quarter lower than last week on an average and stock cattle and feeding steers went at prices that ranged from nearly steady on the best to 10@15c lower on the fair to poor kinds. It was a slow and uneven trade all around.

Cattle quotations: Prime yearlings, \$9.50@10.50; good to choice beefs, \$8.50@9.00; fair to good beefs, \$8.00@8.40; common to fair beefs, \$7.00@7.80; good to choice heifers, \$6.25@7.50; good to choice cows, \$5.75@6.75; fair to good cows, \$5.25@5.75; canners and cutters, \$4.50@5.00; veal calves, \$7.50@9.50; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.25@7.10; good to choice feeders, \$7.75@8.25; fair to good feeders, \$7.00@7.65; common to fair feeders, \$6.00@7.00; stock heifers, \$5.50@6.50; stock cows, \$5.00@6.25; stock calves, \$6.00@8.00; good to choice range beefs, \$7.75@8.25; fair to good range beefs, \$7.25@7.75; common to fair beefs, \$6.00@7.00.

About 5,200 hogs showed up yesterday. The market was fairly active and the general trade was easily steady and before the close a number of sales looked to be a nickel higher. Bulk moved at \$6.85@6.95, and tops reached \$7.00.

Sheep and lamb receipts totaled 4,800 head. In spite of a light run of sheep and lambs, the trade was slow and dull, with prices generally weak to 10@15c lower than the close of last week. The slow and dull trade was attributed to the discouraging advices from eastern points and to the packers claiming that the schedule of prices on this market was already too high compared with Chicago. Some native lambs brought \$8.50 and a shipment of Mexican yearlings sold at \$7.50.

WILL DO LIKE CALIFORNIANS

Cheyenne County Farmer Will Try Pump Irrigation on Thirty Acres as a Starter

From Lodge Pole Express: John Jenik, who recently returned from an extended trip through the irrigated regions of the western coast, has decided that his own farm offers as good advantages as many of the places he visited. At some of the truck farms where they were pumping water over 200 feet to irrigate their crops he told them that he had a farm in Nebraska where he could get an unlimited supply of water at forty feet and they laughed and asked him what better layout than that a man could want. Out there it is not what it will cost to get water but the fact that they can obtain water at any price that makes land valuable. Here around Lodge Pole there is an inexhaustible underground stream that can be raised to the surface at a very moderate cost yet we have lived here all these years and not taken advantage of our opportunities.

Mr. Jenik's trip has opened his eyes to the fact that right here at home we have opportunities that only need to be taken advantage of. If people in California and Washington can pump water 200 feet and irrigate land that does not compare with ours in fertility or smoothness and by so doing make it worth a thousand dollars an acre, we certainly ought to be able to raise the value of our land when we only have to raise water from ten to twenty feet. Mr. Jenik is now planning to put about thirty acres under irrigation as an experiment, and after what he has seen feels confident of success.
