Broome Bill Passes House H. R. No. 127 passed the house of representatives at Lincoln Tuesday by a vote of 60 to 27. This is the bill introduced by Representative Broome of Alliance which allows citles of 5,000 to 25,000 to levy a special tax not greater than five mills for a commercial and advertising fund, when submitted to popular vote and ratified. The bill will probably pass the state senate and become a law. This would allow Alliance to make a levy which would raise approximately \$2,500.
