LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Beef Supply Meager and Values About Steady.

HOG MARKET FULLY STEADY.

Sheep Trade Better on Light Receipts. Ewes Active and 20@30 Cents Higher—Some Advance on Lambs—Nothing Going in Feeders.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Feb. 16.—Only 1,200 cattle arrived yesterday. The meager supply of cattle was no very great surprise to the trade after last week's heavy decline. The market yesterday was at no time very active, and for the most part prices were no better than they were the latter part of last week, which means 30@50c lower than a week ago. Reports from other points were extremely bearish. Buyers took hold of the cows and heifers a little more freely than toward the latter part of last week and prices were anywhere from steady to a dime higher than Friday. Veal calves were in very good request and steady, but the outlet for bulls stags, etc., was narrow and values unchanged. The market for attractive light and medium weight stockers and feeders was steady to a shade stronger, but fleshy and rough cattle were not wanted and had to go to the killers, and there was a rather weak feeling in the trade.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice beefs, \$7.25@7.75; fair to good beefs, \$6.50@7.25; common to fair beefs, \$5.50@6.50; good to choice heifers, \$5.75@6.75; good to choice cows, \$5.50@6.25; fair to good cows, \$4.85@5.50; canners and cutters, \$3.50@4.75; veal calves, \$7.00@10.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$4.75@6.00; good to choice feeders, \$6.50@7.25; fair to good feeders, \$6.00@6.50; common to fair feeders, \$5.00@6.00; stock heifers, \$5.25@6.00; stock cows, \$4.75@5.75; stock calves, \$6.00@7.50.

Some 3,400 hogs showed up yesterday. One of the lightest Monday runs in weeks showed up yesterday. Chicago reported weakened values, but the local market was fully steady with the close of last week. Most of the offerings moved at \$6.60@6.62½, and tops reached \$6.65.
