LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Fat Cattle Lower and Feeders Strong,
HOGS GENERALLY STRONGER.

Sharp Advance on Bulk of Lambs. Fully 25@35c Higher Than Last Year—Some Boost to Yearlings. Ewes Big Quarter Higher.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, March 2.—A very fair run of cattle showed up yesterday, about 5,000 head. It was a very sluggish market in beef steers yesterday and prices were fully 10@15c lower than Friday. The demand seemed to be very fair, but as reports from all outside markets were decidedly bearish and supplies were ample the buyers appeared to be in no hurry to fill their orders and sellers found it almost impossible to get early bids raised. Proportions of cows and heifers was not very large and as there was vigorous competition from feeder buyers, in addition to the usual inquiry from local packers and outside butchers, the market opened fairly brisk for anything good enough to attract competition and prices bid were steady to strong. The spurt did not last long, however, and later all grades were hard to move at prices that were weak to a dime lower than Friday. There was a vigorous demand for stockers and feeders and the trade was lively, with prices right around 10@15c higher for good green stock.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice heaves, \$7.80@8.30; fair to good heaves, \$7.00@7.75; common to fair heaves, \$6.00@7.00; good to choice heifers, \$6.25@7.00; good to choice cows, \$5.80@6.60; fair to good cows, \$5.00@5.75; canners and cutters, \$3.50@4.75; real calves, \$7.00@10.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$4.75@6.25; good to choice feeders, \$7.00@7.50; fair to good feeders, \$6.50@6.90; common to fair feeders, \$5.80@6.40; stock heifers, \$5.50@6.50; stock cows, \$5.00@6.25; stock calves, \$6.00@8.00.

About 9,500 hogs arrived yesterday. Trade was very dull all day, but prices were generally a little stronger than the close of last week. Bulk sold around \$6.50@6.52 1/2, and tops reached \$6.60.
Sheep and lamb receipts totaled 17,000 head. Sharply higher prices were paid for anything on sale and the trade was active at the advance. The improvement amounted to fully 25@35c on lambs and yearlings, as compared with last Friday, and 25c on ewes. Fresh tops for the year to date were made all along the line, there being both fed western and Mexican lambs good enough to sell up to \$9.35. Mexican yearlings at \$8.65 and fed western ewes at \$7.25.

Many Agricultural Agents
County agricultural agent work, which has been undertaken in eight counties in Nebraska, is rapidly assuming large proportions in the United States. In the northern and western states alone there are about 300 counties employing these agents, or farm demonstrators, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, according to a recent incomplete report. Among the north central states employing these agents are Illinois with 14; Indiana, 28; Iowa, 9; Kansas, 9; Michigan, 16; Minnesota, 25; Missouri, 14; North Dakota, 21; South Dakota, 3; and Wisconsin, 11. Massachusetts employs 17, New York, 27, and Pennsylvania, 14. California, Oregon and Washington have 10 each; Colorado, 9; Utah, 7; Montana, 6; New Mexico, 5; and Wyoming and Idaho, 3 each.
