STATE VETERINARIAN We believe that the best interests of the live stock men and the farmers will be conserved by keeping in office, as long as their services are satisfactory, men having to do with live stock sanitary work. The last legislature created the Live Stock Sanitary Board, and in doing so intended that work in this department should be taken out of politics as nearly as possible, and the governor relieved of this responsibility imposed on him by the statute.

We believe our present deputy state veterinarian, Dr. L. C. Kigin, is honestly and conscientiously doing all he can to protect the live stock men of Nebraska in the controlling and eliminating of animal diseases. This Congress would suggest to the Live Stock Sanitary Board that the best interests of the live stock men of Nebraska would be conserved in the office of the state veterinarian by their recommending to the governor Dr. Kigin's retention in office, and we would respectfully ask of Governor Morehead that Dr. Kigin be re-tained in his present official capacity.

The secretary of the Congress directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the governor of Nebraska, the president of the Live Stock Sanitary Board and to Dr. Kigin.


