Mr. Mollring's father, A. F. Moll-ring, was a "freighter" between St. Joseph and Denver in the early days, and at the time of the California gold rush, in 1849, he was one who made the perilous trip, investing nearly all his money, which was lost. However, he came out with a small amount of gold which he sent to England and had made into a watch, which is in valued at several hundred dollars, as it is constructed entirely of gold, even to the dial and hands.

These keepsakes were handed down to the son in a tin box, similar in shape and size to the present day "lockers" which are used by private individuals in place of a safe. The box was made in St. Louis about forty years ago.


