

## MORE DIVORCE CASES

Coming Term of District Court Promises to Be Well Filled with This Class

Two more divorce petitions have been filed with the district court during the past week, both of which were filed by the wives and the grounds of both were cruelty and neglect.

Amy J. Keintop claims that she was married to Wm. F. Keintop at Alliance on December 16, 1907. They lived together until February 2, 1915, when he decided to hunt for a new location as an automobile mechanic, and she was sent to the home of his parents at Creston, Iowa, to remain until he was settled, and he was then to send for her. That was the last heard from him for some time, and on May 5 of this year his parents made known the fact that they did not care for her further company and she was asked to move. She wrote to her husband at San Francisco, where she had found he was located, asking for transportation to the coast city, but he ignored the request, and she returned to Alliance. The petition further states that the defendant had frequently cursed and beaten the plaintiff, and that on several occasions he had asked her to get a divorce, as he no longer cared for her. He is also charged with adulterous conduct with a certain Alliance woman whose name is not divulged in the petition. It is further stated that the defendant has an earning capacity of \$125 to \$150 a month, and holds 4,000 shares in the Alliance garage, which is 50 per cent of the total stock, and that the garage building is now renting for \$1,800 a year, and it is asked that he be required to pay a reasonable alimony.

The second case is that of Kathryn Rawn vs. Peter C. Rawn. She claims they were married in Littleton, Colo., on August 25, 1904. The petition charges desertion and extreme cruelty. On July 29, 1914, it is claimed, he deserted her and since that time has refused to support her, and has on many occasions called her vile and obscene names, striking her many times, and asking her to get a divorce as he cared more for the society of other women. The petition further states that he boasted of his infidelity to the plaintiff and his association with other women, and that his blows had caused serious bodily injury, all these actions being without any just cause on her part.

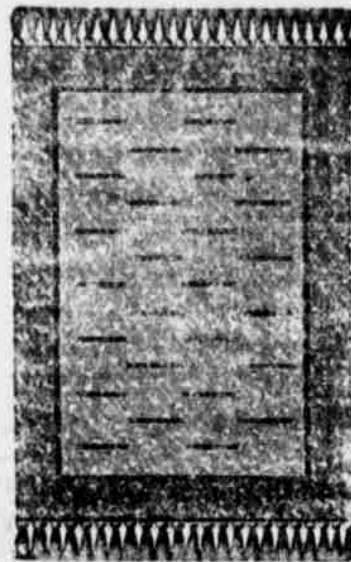
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
