

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Alliance, Nebr., June 15, 1915. The board of county commissioners met as a board of equalization Tuesday, June 15th, 1915, as provided by law. Members present: J. M. Wanek, chairman; C. L. Hashman and George W. Duncan, John Jelinek, county assessor and M. S. Hargraves, clerk.

R. D. Pollard, tax agent for the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company, appeared before the board and objected to the listing of taxation of certain property of said company in Lake precinct and filed his objections thereto. The board decided that as the question was before the supreme court they would let the assessments stand as made by the precinct assessor.

Paul Armstrong appeared before the board and complained of the valuation of the SE 1/4 of section 22, township 28, range 49, and same was found to be too high a valuation in comparison with other property and was adjusted accordingly.

The balance of the day was spent by the board comparing values in personal property in the different precincts.

Whereupon the board adjourned until tomorrow morning, June 16th, 1915.

Alliance, Nebr., June 16, 1915. The board of county commissioners met as a board of equalization pursuant to adjournment. Officers present: J. M. Wanek, chairman; C. L. Hashman, John Jelinek, county assessor, and M. S. Hargraves, clerk.

John Dougherty appeared before the board and complained of the value placed on lot 1, block 1, second county addition and the valuation was ordered equalized with other property and ordered placed at \$2,500.

Simon Spry appeared before the board and complained of the values of lots 2, 3, 4, block 30, original town, and same was ordered equalized and value placed at \$1050.

The balance of the day was spent by the board comparing values in personal property in the different precincts.

H. E. Reddish appeared before the board and complained of the values as placed on the 5th 50-ft. of lot 1, block "V", Sheridan addition to Alliance, Nebraska. And the same was equalized and placed at the value of \$700. A reduction was ordered on the valuation of lot 1, block 2, Hitchcock, Hills and Snedeker's Addition, and ordered placed at \$800.

The board remained in session June 18th and 19th, comparing values of personal property and adjusting complaints on same.

Whereupon the board adjourned until Wednesday, June 23rd, 1915.

Alliance, Nebr., June 21, 1915. The board of county commissioners met in regular session, Monday, June 21st, 1915, as provided by the statute. Officers present: J. M. Wanek, chairman; C. L. Hashman and Geo. W. Duncan.

The matter of the establishment of a road petitioned by A. M. Miller, et al, coming on for consideration before the board an order was made as follows:

Be It Remembered, that on the 23rd day of June, 1915, the matter of the establishment of a road of record as No. 53 coming up to be heard before the commissioners upon his petition, report of special commissioner, approval of notice to said land owners, summons to the sheriff, his return thereon, the affidavit of publication, notice to appraisers and their appraisal thereon. It is ordered that said road be established and vacated as prayed for in the petition, and described as follows:

Beginning at a point 33 min. east and 446 min. south of the section corner common to sections 19, 20, 29 and 30, township 28, north, range 49 west, thence north 63 deg. 51 min. east, 981 feet, thence north 45 deg. 48 min. east, 42 min. west, 750 feet, thence north 37 deg. 9 min. west, 500 feet, thence north 17 deg. 45 min. west, 800 feet, thence north 32 deg. 12 min. west, 1444 feet, to the county road, be established, and that that part of county road No. 6 beginning at a point 446 min. south of the section corner common to sections 19, 20, 29 and 30, township 28 north, range 49 west, thence north on section line 4202 feet, be vacated; that the width of same be sixty-six feet and that the same be opened as required by law.

It is further ordered by the board that the claim for damages be allowed as per appraiser's report.

The balance of the day was spent by the board in checking claims on file.

Whereupon the board adjourned until tomorrow morning, June 22nd, at 9 o'clock.

Nells M. Peterson appeared before the board and complained of the value as placed on the NW 1/4 of section 25, township 26, range 51, same was ordered equalized and value was placed at \$750, also on complaint of Benjamin F. Elsen, on section 7, township 25, range 51, value was placed at \$1,500.

The balance of the day was spent by the board comparing values of assessments of personal property.

LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Beef Market Fully Steady, but Not Very Active.

HOGS RECEIVE A HARD BUMP.

Sheep and Lambs Make a Big Jump. Suring Lambs Around 40c Higher. Ewes Are Fifteen Cents Up—Everything Sells Early.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, June 29.—Cattle receipts totaled 3,500 head yesterday. The fat cattle market was fully steady, although rather slow. Good to choice cattle, both heavy and light, sold at steady to possibly a little stronger figures and the plain and unfinished kinds going at steady to possibly a shade lower prices. Cows and heifers were in good demand and practically everything at all useful in this line sold at prices strong to a dime higher than Friday. Veal calves were about steady, and bulls, stags, etc., were in very fair request and notably unchanged. Anything at all attractive in the way of stockers and feeders sold readily and well, but the common light stuff was more or less of a drug on the market.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice yearlings, \$8.75@9.35; fair to good yearlings, \$8.00@8.60; good to choice heaves, \$8.50@9.25; fair to good heaves, \$8.30@8.60; common to fair heaves, \$7.25@8.25; prime heifers, \$7.75@8.35; good to choice heifers, \$7.00@7.50; good to choice cows, \$6.50@7.35; fair to good cows, \$5.50@6.25; canners and cutters, \$4.00@5.50; veal calves, \$5.00@10.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.25@7.25; good to choice feeders, \$7.60@8.20; fair to good feeders, \$6.75@7.50; common to fair feeders, \$5.50@6.50; stock heifers, \$5.75@7.00; stock cows, \$5.50@6.50; stock calves, \$5.00@7.50.

About 9,700 hogs arrived yesterday. The market was slow, with prices largely 15c lower than the close of last week. Bulk of the hogs sold around \$7.20@7.30, with \$7.25 the popular price. Shippers paid as high as \$7.45 for a few choice hogs.

Sheep and lamb receipts amounted to 9,300 head. Prices went up like a rocket yesterday. Spring lambs sold around 40c higher than the best time last week, and the trade was so active at the advance that everything was disposed of before 10 o'clock in the morning. The best Idaho spring sold at \$10.35. Ewes were 15c higher, the top being \$5.50. Omaha was the big spot on the map yesterday, having more sheep and lambs than any other market.
