## DROWNED IN CANAL

Little Margaret Coleman, of Scottsbluff, Perished When Automobile Skidded into Water

A sad accident that is sadder still when the age of the little victim is considered, occurred three miles from Wynote, Wyo., Tuesday of last week when little Margaret Coleman, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Beach Coleman, of Scottsbluff, was drowned when the automobile in which they were riding skidded into the government canal, Wynote, Wyo., is about fifty miles from Scottsbluff.

Tuesday morning Mr. and Mrs. Claude H. Westervelt, Mrs. Harvey L. Sams and daughter Angelina, and Mr. and Mrs. Coleman and daughter Margaret started from Scottsbluff for an outing in Yellowstone Park. They were using two automobiles, a new Chalmers seven-passenger car owned by Mr. Westervelt, and a Ford, owned by Mr. Coleman. The party had been advised that the regular route was almost impossible on account of the recent heavy rains, but that a road followed the south bank of the government canal and that they would save time by going this route, which they later decided to do.

Mr. Coleman and Mrs. Westervelt in the small car preceded, being followed by the Chalmers with Mr. Westervelt driving. In the first car were Mrs. Sams and daughter, and on account of the extra room in the large car, little Margaret was riding there. For about three-quarters of a mile all went well, the road seeming solid, and the drivers being very careful. Mr. Westervelt stated that he was not running more than ten miles an hour. The smaller car made the trip without difficulty, and the Chalmers was several hundred yards behind when, without warning, the rear wheels began to slip and the car went into the water, which was about ten feet deep at that point. The top was up, and one wheel showed slightly above the water after the machine had turned turtle in its short journey.

Mr. Westervelt, although a powerful swimmer, was handicapped by his heavy automobile gloves, but succeeded in getting Mrs. Coleman safely on shore. Mrs. Sams, with rare presence of mind under such circumstances, clung to the visible automobile wheel until she too, was rescued by Mr. Westervelt. All then looked for the little girl, but they could not be seen. Hope began to wane when the black hair of Angelina Sams appeared on the surface, and she was rescued, although she had been in the water for several minutes. It required some time and effort to resuscitate her. The attention of all was then turned to little Margaret Coleman, but there was no trace of her. It was at first thought that she had been pinned beneath the auto. Mr. Coleman, who had unconsciously glanced back to see if the other car was coming, quickly realized what had happened and ran back to assist. He dived under the submerged car until he was exhausted in his efforts to locate his daughter, but to no avail.

A neighboring rancher was the first to come to the scene, and soon afterward a large party had gathered, ready to lend a helping hand. Engineer Weis, of the Reclamation Service, came with the others; and ordered the head gates of the canal closed. The accident occurred shortly after noon, and at 5 o'clock the automobile was hauled out, only to reveal the fact that the little girl was not near the scene of the accident, and that she had been carried down with the swift current.

The sorrowing parents were then persuaded to return to Torrington, Wyo., while a searching party was organized and the canal was dragged. The searching continued day and night, with alternate changes of crews, until Thursday noon, when the body of the little girl was found buried under a foot of sand almost a mile from where the accident occurred. The rescuers were almost useless in their work, and distanced every foot of the canal for a distance of fifteen miles many times. Willing helpers furnished automobiles for transportation, and the housewives of the neighborhood furnished the workers with sandwiches and coffee. Fully five hundred participated in the rescue work.

The telephone company installed a field telephone on the ground, to be used free by everyone, and the operators paid especial attention to calls from there.

The blame is not attached to anyone. Mr. Westervelt is a steady, careful man, and it was probably through his efforts that the entire party were not drowned. The little girl was seven years old, and was loved by both old and young people at Scottsbluff. The funeral was held there Friday afternoon.
