LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Cattle Receipts Large and Prices Weak to 10c Lower.

HOGS STEADY TO TEN LOWER

Lambs Ten to Fifteen Cents Lower, With Bulk of Sales at \$8.80@8.90. Feeder Lambs in Good Demand at Steady Prices.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Aug. 31.—Cattle receipts were very large yesterday, about 9,000 head being reported in. Cornfed beefs changed hands at prices that did not show much change as compared with last week, being in the main about steady. The best yearlings here sold up to \$9.75. Western beefs were weak to 10c lower. The general run of butcher stock, that is, cows, heifers, etc., were steady to 10c lower, and the same was true of stockers and feeders.

Quotations on cattle: Good to choice fed yearlings, \$9.00@9.70; fair to good fed yearlings, \$7.75@9.00; common to fair fed yearlings, \$6.75@7.75; good to choice heary beefs, \$3.75@9.25; fair to good cornfed beefs, \$3.25@8.75; common to fair cornfed beefs, \$7.00@8.25; prime grass beefs, \$3.10@8.50; good to choice grass beefs, \$7.00@8.00; fair to good grass beefs, \$7.25@7.60; common to fair grass beefs, \$6.40@7.25; good to choice fed heifers, \$7.00@8.50; good to choice fed cows, \$6.50@7.25; good to choice grass heifers, \$7.00@8.50; good to choice grass cows, \$6.00@6.50; fair to good cows, \$5.25@6.00; common to fair cows, \$4.00@5.25; good to choice feeders, \$7.50@8.00 fair to good feeders, \$4.70@7.50; common to fair feeders, \$5.50@6.70; stock heifers, \$5.75@6.75; stock cows, \$5.50@6.50; stock calves, \$6.50@8.00; veal calves, \$7.00@10.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.00@6.25.

Receipts of hogs yesterday amounted to only 3,500 head. Good lights were generally 10c lower. Best shipping grades reached \$7.50. Packing hogs sold largely at prices that were not over 5c lower, and in several cases were steady or very close to it. Most of the packing hogs sold at \$6.40@6.60, with scattering sales of real good butchers and lights on up to the top.

Receipts of sheep and lambs yesterday totaled 35,000 head. Lambs were 10@15c lower, bulk of the offerings bringing \$8.80@8.90, with two or three strings setting a top of \$9.00. The demand for feeding lambs continued very good and prices were fully steady with last week's close, being quoted as stronger in spots. Most of the desirable feeders sold around \$5.25, while several sales were reported as high as \$5.40, which was the extreme top last week. Feeder buyers were thick in the yards and breeding and feeding ewes brought good firm figures, bulk of the aged ones going at \$5.75@6.00. Ewes made up practically the entire mutton supply. Best kinds reached \$5.75 and there was a good representation on down to \$5.50, with the less desirable grades under this figure.

This new feature should prove to be a popular innovation, especially to women and children, who dislike the idea of changing cars.
