THE INTERSTATE LIVE STOCK FAIR

A Cosmopolitan Exhibition at Sioux City for the Three States of Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota

BIG FAIR GROWING IN FAVOR

"Cosmopolitan," that's the word. A big fair, the interest in which is not confined to one small locality, but reaches from the fertile fields of the Iowa and eastern Nebraska corn belt, to the broad prairies of South Dakota and the sand hills ranch country of western Nebraska—that gives but an intimation of the interest that is being taken in the thirteenth annual fair of the Interstate Live Stock Fair Association, which is being held at Sioux City this week, September 20 to 25.

This is practically a state fair with an interstate patronage. It has been a great success with increasing interest as the years go by. How much it has benefited the live stock interests of the middle west it would be hard to accurately estimate.

There are a number of reasons why the Interstate Live Stock Fair has been a great success, a few of which we wish to mention in this connection. First and foremost is the enterprise and foresight of the management. In traveling around over the middle west, one finds that Sioux City business men have the reputation of being "live wires". In looking over the list of names of officers and directors, one finds that it contains many of the leading business men of Sioux City and neighboring towns, as will be seen by the following roster: F. L. Eaton, president; L. L. Kellogg, vice pres.; W. S. A. Smith, second vice pres.; Joe Morton, secretary; A. T. Bennett, treasurer; L. W. Mallory, M. L. Flinn, T. A. Black, W. J. Downey, H. G. Sioux City is the center of a splendid farming and stock raising country, comprising part of the three states of Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota; besides it is accessible to a prosperous ranch country in Nebraska and South Dakota, lying beyond what is commonly looked upon as being the agricultural belt.

Another factor, and not a small one by any means, is the enthusiastic support given the fair by the citizens of Sioux City who are not officially connected with it. Many a public enterprise has come to an untimely end or dragged out a worse than useless existence because of some persons who ought to have been boosters becoming knockers. If there are any knockers within the bounds of Sioux City, we don't know where to find them.

A number of other contributing causes of the success of the Interstate Live Stock Fair could be named, but to mention one more will suffice for the present, and that is the location of the fair grounds. Woodland Park, the home of the fair, is an ideal place—simply lovely during the summer and early autumn. Persons who wish to take a short vacation or a week's outing, find this a fine place to camp. Those who do not wish to camp will find it pleasant to spend a few days at the fair in the park, stopping at night in the city, between which and the park ample transportation facilities are afforded by electric railway.

Readers of this paper who are not so fortunate as to be able to attend the Interstate Live Stock Fair at Sioux City this year should put on their list for the years to come.
