

STATE PROHIBITION

Union Meeting of Alliance Churches Last Sunday Night Turns out to be a Rousing Rally

TEMPERANCE FORCES BLAZED

As announced thru the city papers last week, National Constitutional Amendment Day, Sunday, December 13, was celebrated in Alliance by a union evening meeting at the Christian church, Box Butte avenue and Eighth street.

There was a large attendance, the church being filled, and the reception given by the audience to the rendition of the program was so cordial as to be a source of satisfaction to all who were interested in seeing the rally a success, and especially to the members of the W. C. T. U. under whose auspices the meeting was held. Those who have given most attention to the program of prohibition sentiment in Nebraska express the utmost confidence that the proposed amendment to the state constitution will be adopted next year. An earnest effort will be made to place Box Butte county in line with the balance of the state. The rally that was held last Sunday night augurs well for the effort.

The program consisted of songs by a union choir under direction of Mr. Paul Thomas, scripture reading and prayer, a number of short addresses, collection to replenish the funds of the W. C. T. U., and the signing of petitions for the submission of the proposed constitutional amendment.

BOX BUTTE COUNTY DRY FEDERATION

Meeting in the Court House Next Saturday to Organize for the Coming Dry Campaign

TEMPERANCE FORCES HOPEFUL

The executive committee of the Nebraska Dry Federation has recommended that county dry federations be organized, auxiliary to the state federation. Pursuant to this recommendation, a call has been issued for a meeting to be held in the court house in Alliance, next Saturday, December 18, at 2:30 p. m., for the purpose of organizing the Box Butte County Dry Federation, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting.

All citizens of Box Butte county of legal age, men and women, who favor the adoption of statewide, constitutional prohibition of the liquor traffic in Nebraska, are requested to attend and participate in the deliberations of the convention. All churches, Sunday schools and other religious organizations; fraternal and benevolent societies; clubs for social or civic improvement; all other organizations and institutions within Box Butte county, that favor the adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment, are invited to be represented at the convention by as many members or other persons as they may choose to select for that purpose.

Where it is not practicable for any organization, desiring to be represented at the convention, to hold a meeting to select representatives, it is recommended that the pastor, presiding officer or secretary select persons for that purpose and request them to attend.

All citizens of Box Butte county who favor the adoption of the prohibi-

tion and who are present at the meeting, but who have not been appointed to represent any church or other organization, will be recognized as members of the convention and permitted to participate in its deliberations, the same as those who hold credentials as delegates.

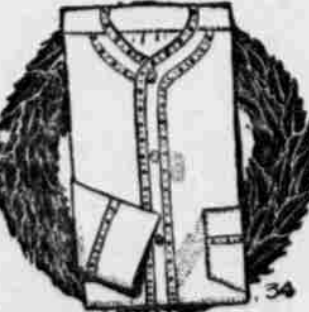
