**Buy Seed Now**  
Farmers who last fall neglected to lay up or buy a sufficient supply of good seed corn should neglect it no longer. The College of Agriculture says that indications are that despite the realization of a shortage during the fall, the situation is still critical, and the man who buys late will probably pay more and get poorer corn than if he buys at once. This situation seems to be particularly true in the North Platte country. The College says that those who cannot get sound 1915 corn had better fall back on the 1914 supply if it is to be had, as it is for the most part in excellent condition.

A number of farmers are looking up their supply of alfalfa and sweet clover seed for the coming season. Again, the indications seem to point to the fact that the supply of good quality is limited and that the early buyer, with more time in which to test samples, will have a better chance of getting the best to be had at a cheaper price.

**Big Profit from Clean Seed**  
The average profit of five demonstration plots planted to potatoes the past season in Box Butte county showed an estimated increased profit of \$26.90 an acre as compared with the proceeds from other fields planted with tubers affected with this disease.

Clean seed gave an average yield of 188.97 bushels an acre, while the seed affected with dry rot gave a yield of 112.09 bushels per acre, or a difference of 76.88 bushels in favor of the clean seed. The difference in yield at 35 cents per bushel gives an increase of \$26.90 per acre.

The demonstration was conducted cooperatively under the direction of the Box Butte county agricultural agent and the Department of Agricultural Botany of the College of Agriculture.

**Offer Instruction to Dairymen**  
In order to increase its usefulness to as large a number of citizens of the state as possible, a short course in dairying for dairy field and creamery and station operators will be given by the Dairy Department of the University of Nebraska during the week of February 21 to 26. The course will include work on grading on the quality basis, use of cooling tanks, care of milk and cream, butter making, milk testing, and factory and station management. Some work in feeding and judging dairy cattle, care of dairy herds, and milk reduction will also be included. The course will be given as lectures followed by suitable laboratory work. In addition, students will have an opportunity to visit several of the most modern dairies, creameries, and ice cream factories.

**Cost of Carrying Water**  
Twenty-five gallons of water is the average daily house use on most farms. It should be 150 gallons. To carry 25 gallons means at least five trips, and if these trips are up a hill 12 feet high, as is often the case, a 160-pound man does as much work in carrying his body up the hill for 25 days as is required to dig and wall a well 4 feet in diameter and 12 feet deep. Most wells are about 50 feet deep; then in four months' time a man has done sufficient work in carrying water up a 12 foot hill to dig a well and wall it right at his back porch, and in ten years he has wanted 30 wells and still has no well.—Department of Agricultural Engineering, University Farm.
