## PAPER RAISES IN PRICE

Wholesale Paper Dealers Blame High Price of Rags for Raises in Cost of Paper Stock

The Herald Publishing Company, publisher of The Herald, is daily receiving notices from the wholesale paper houses of advances in the cost of paper stock of all kinds. Notices received this morning from two wholesale houses quote a raise of twenty-five per cent in the cost of print paper, and of higher amounts on other papers.

Because of contracts for print paper, which is used in immense quantities at this office, we will not be affected on this stock until the contracts expire.

The manufacturers state that cotton rags which sold for from one and one-half to two and one-half cents per pound in 1915 are now bringing from three to five and one-half cents. Bleach, which sold at \$1.35 per cwt., now sells for \$1.50 to \$2. The shortage in bleach is responsible for the yellowish color of most of the newspapers. Aniline colors which sold at from 40c to \$1 per pound now sell for \$1.10 to \$2. Bleach, caustic and sulphite are not to be obtained except by contract. Aniline colors are over-sold and every mill is in want. Cotton rags are being bought by ammunition factories which are willing to pay high prices, and importations are entirely cut off.

If it were not for prosperous times the large dailies in the cities would be forced to decrease the size of their papers and the smaller newspapers would probably be forced to follow suit. With a weekly paper of the circulation of The Herald, running in size from twelve to twenty-four pages, it keeps us hustling to keep supplied with paper stock.


