**BEEVES TOUCH HIGH PRICE**

Choice Steffy Stuff Closed \$7.00 to \$7.75. Hog Market Firm Steady With Nickel Lower. Sheep Receipts Brisk.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., March 14, 1916.—The week opened with rather a liberal supply of cattle on the market, receipts totalling 329 loads or 8,200 head, with a tendency on the part of dressed beef buyers to shade the price a trifle lower than the close of the market last week. Good to choice 1,100 to 1,500 pound beeves sold at \$8.90 to \$9.25, the latter price being as high price as has been paid for beeves this year. The supply of the stuff was also liberal, and prices somewhat lower than Friday, some choice helfery stuff selling from \$7.00 to \$7.75, or about same as late last week. Supply of stock and feeding cattle liberal with good brisk demand from Yard Traders and country buyers, making a good active market.

Cattle quotations: Prime beeves, \$9.25 to \$9.50; good to choice beeves, \$8.90 to \$9.25; fair to good beeves, \$8.50 to \$8.90; common to fair beeves, \$7.50 to \$8.50; good to choice helfers, \$7.25 to \$8.25; good to choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7.75; fair to good cows, \$6.25 to \$6.75; canners and cutters, \$1.50 to \$6.00; veal calves, \$7.00 to \$10.00; bulls, stars, etc., \$5.50 to \$7.25; good to choice stackers, \$7.75 to \$8.25; good to choice feeders, \$7.65 to \$8.10; fair to good feeders, \$7.30 to \$7.60; common to fair feeders, \$6.00 to \$7.00; stock helfers, \$6.75 to \$7.75; stock cows, \$6.00 to \$7.25; stock calves, \$7.00 to \$8.00.

Sheep and lamb receipts totalled 9,500 head, with lambs of the better class selling at about steady prices, two good loads of light Mexican lambs changing hands at \$11.25 and good bandyweight western lambs selling at \$11.10, with a choice load of ewes reaching the high point of \$8.25.

Ford and the Standard May Enter into Competition on Low-Priced Cars

Manufacturer's News prints a story that indicates that automobiles will be made to sell as low as \$100 to \$250 each. The gist of the story is that the Standard Oil Company has a carburetor that will burn kerosene as efficiently as gasoline that they sought to have Henry Ford utilize in his plant. The Standard has more kerosene than it knows what to do with.

It wants some of the demand of gasoline switched over to kerosene. But Ford laughed at the idea. However, the Standard is not greatly dismayed by Ford's refusal to respond to their proposition.

They can equip factories of their own, and consumption of kerosene is the object. They will make kerosene-burning cars and distribute them at cost to manufacture and distribute.

Ford will come back at them, and threatens that he can make Fords for \$200 each. So there you are. Competitors such as the Standard and Ford get into the game, \$100 motor cars may be a reality. Burning kerosene or gasoline would not make a whit of difference to anyone if the cars run all right.
