Large Number of United States Civil Service Examinations to be Held in Alliance Soon

J. N. Johnston, local secretary, announces that the following civil service examinations will take place in Alliance on the dates given. Full information and application blanks can be secured from him at the Alliance post office.

April 12-13. Laboratory assistant, male, qualified in paper technology, salary \$900 to \$1200.

April 19. Junior signal engineer, interstate commerce commission, male, salaries \$720 to \$1680. Mechanical and electrical inspector, male, salary \$672. Assistant in dry land arboriculture, male, salary \$900 to \$1500. Junior structural engineer, male, salary \$720 to \$1680.

April 25. Electrical draftsman, male, salary \$5.94 per day. Chief statistician for vital statistics, male, salary \$3,000.

May 2. Blacksmith and horseshoer, male, salary \$720.

May 3. Assistant physicist, qualified in spectroscopy, male, salary \$1400 to \$1800.

May 3-4. Inspector of locomotives, male, salary \$1800 and expenses.

THE NEWSPAPER TRIP

Nebraska Editorial Association Will Visit Alliance on Annual Convention Trip in July

Horace M. Davis of Ord, president, and C. C. Johns of Grand Island, secretary, of the Nebraska Press Association, in a circular letter dated March 27, give the following information regarding the annual meeting of the association to be held in June or July of this year:

"We have tentative plans made for the most enjoyable and profitable meeting that the Nebraska Press Association has ever had in its history, and we need YOUR help and co-operation to make it a success.

The exact date of the proposed trip has not been definitely decided upon, but it will be some time in July or August. The date will be fixed later and more details of the trip given to you.

"Our plans at present are as follows: Our special train will leave Grand Island Monday afternoon, about 4 o'clock. This will give all editors an opportunity to reach Grand Island by that time. The first stop will be at Broken Bow, where a banquet and entertainment will be given. Alliance will be reached in time for breakfast; from Alliance we will go to Crawford, auting to Chadron and back. From that point a night run will be made to Sidney, then back to Bridgeport, and from there to Gering and Scottsbluff, where the main sessions will be held. Coming back our train will be switched to the Union Pacific track, and stops will be made at Oshkosh, North Platte, Kearney and Grand Island.

"This trip will consume the greater part of a week. All of the towns to be visited have made special plans for entertaining the editors.

"The special train will consist of Pullman and tourist sleepers and will be entirely at the disposal of the editors throughout the entire trip.

"The cost of this trip will be \$16.70 per person from Grand Island and return for railroad fare. The Pullman rates are \$1.50 to \$1 per day per person.

"At the present time, we hope to be able to have a special fund, which must be raised to partly finance the trip and to pro-rate each person making the trip a portion of this expense. The plans for this are not completed at present and a more detailed statement will be made later.

"As we said before, this will be a grand trip. It will enable the newspaper fraternity of the state to see Western Nebraska, and partake of her liberal hospitality.

"It will be an ideal outing and every editor should go. Plans have been made for the regular business sessions of the association, so that portion of the annual meeting will be well cared for.

"A uniformed band will accompany the editors and many other features will be added."

Will Probe Paper Prices

Washington, March 27—A resolution for an investigation of the newspaper paper situation by the department of commerce was introduced in the house today by Representative Copley of Illinois. Much of the supply of raw material for print paper that came from Germany, Norway and Sweden was cut off by the war. Other material is being shipped from this country to Europe for use in the manufacture of munitions, the resolution says. An opinion is asked on the advisability of placing an embargo on raw material.

According to Mr. Copley, the price of paper has advanced so far that the lives of many small newspapers are threatened.
