gation district under the state law, which requires that all of the land must share in paying the maintenance charges, whether water is taken or not.

This, with other reasons that could be mentioned, is having the desired effect of putting in motion plans for having this splendid tract of land put under cultivation and irrigation in the near future.

The water right of the Bridgeport Irrigation District is Number 8 under the state law. This gives a priority of right that practically insures an abundance of water at all times, but to insure against any unfavorable emergency that might possibly arise in a dry year, a contract has been made with the government for 15,000 acre feet of water annually from the Pathfinder dam, which means a foot of water for all the irrigable land, in addition to what it is entitled to under its water right.
