"Ireland's Case and Bohemians"
To the Editor of The Journal:—Jeremiah Quin, in today's Free Press talks about the hypocrisy of England when she proclaimed herself protector of small nationalities.

England did wrong to Ireland in the past—there is no question about that. But compare the position of Ireland under English rule with the position of Bohemia under Teutonic rule at the present time.

Ireland will surely get home rule. Just before war, a home rule act was passed by commons. The Bohemian landtag was disavowed before the war, and the rule of a Teuton commission was established. This was done in 1913, perhaps to prevent the Bohemian people from expressing their protest against the war policy of the Teutons.

Ireland was excluded from conscription. In Bohemia, 92 per cent of the men are in the army. Children 18 and grandfathers 55 are forced to fight for the Hapsburg dynasty. There is no food famine in Ireland. As long as English people have something to eat, the Irish people will not be hungry. In Bohemia the Teutons seized all foodstuffs to feed the Germans, and only what was formerly used to feed the pigs was left in the country to feed the Bohemian people.

There is very little, if any, persecution of Irish people in Ireland. In Bohemia over 700 innocent persons were hanged and thousands are yet kept in jail. Newspapers are suppressed and a reign of terror is established. Who is the real oppressor, Mr. Quin? Ant. Jecmen. Milwaukee, Feb. 23, 1916.

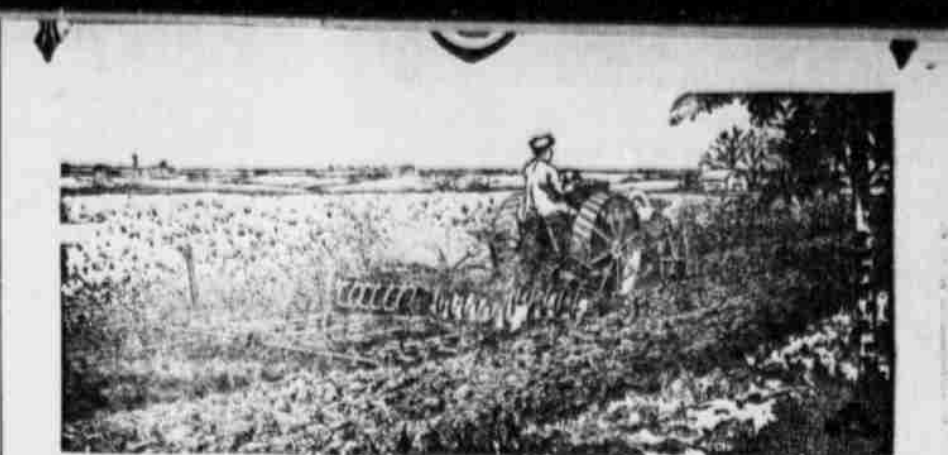
