Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Alliance, Nebraska

Section 1. No person shall bring into the City of Alliance for sale or sell, or offer to sell for consumption in said City, any milk or cream without a permit from the City of Alli-

ance Section 2. No person-shall bring into the City of Alliance for sale, or

sell or offer for sale, any milk or cream which has been obtained from any milk dealer, dairyman, or other person, not having a permit issued by the City of Alliance to sell same for consumption within said city.

Section 3. Permits shall be re newed annually, May 1. The applicant must state his name, residence, postoffice address and the location of his business place or places, and the clinical symptoms of tuberculosis or number of cows from which milk is from a herd which contains any obtained for sale and the number of diseased cattle, or are afflicted with quarts (estimated) sold daily. 




