RAILROAD NOTES

Chief Dispatcher A. V. Gavin and family left Tuesday night for a short visit at Friend, Nebr., where Mr. Gavin's father is in very poor health. Jerry Madden, chief clerk in Train Master D. J. Nelson's office, who was sent to Chicago on special work April 26, was transferred to New York City temporarily Tuesday of this week.

Wage Increase for Employees

All employees of the Burlington railroad in Nebraska are included in a wage increase granted by the road, which became effective May 1. Engineers, firemen and other trainmen, who have a wage scale with the company, are not affected by the increase.

Employees of the road in several other states are also included in the increase and is granted officials say in view of the fact that the cost of living is continually growing higher.

Signal repairmen on an hourly basis get an increase of one cent per hour.

Bridge and building carpenters receiving 22½ cents or more per hour, get one cent an hour more.

Water service men on hourly basis, one cent an hour more.

Freight house men on hourly basis, one cent an hour more. All other employees on monthly basis, receiving \$124 or less, get approximately a five per cent increase.
