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ZEDIKER AT SIOUX CITY

Alliance Boy Will be One of the Features at Sioux City Roundup on, July 3 to 6

Dwight Zediker, Alliance, Nebr., winner of the world championship belt for relay racing at the Cheyenne frontier days celebration, champion also at the Fort Morgan, Colo., roundup, the Pendelton Stampede and the Walla Walla, Wash., Rodeo, will bring his string of thoroughbred relay horses to the Sioux City Roundup and race during the period from July

Zediker's entry blanks came to Joe Morton, general manager of the Roundup in the mail today. Zediker holds the world record for speed in relay racing, his string of horses having covered the two-mile track with an average speed of 51 seconds to the half mile. Zed ker changed horses and saddles at an average speed of 336 seconds. One of the runners in the Zediker string is said to be worth \$1,800, and all of the horses are valued at more than \$1,-

The Zediker entry is the fifth for the relay events. The Roundup management is particularly anxious to get a large number into this event, because of the spectacular character of the event and because a heavy purse has been offered for daily con-

STATE CAPITOL NEWS

State Auditor Wm. H. Smith Rejects \$1,700,000 Douglas County Bonds on Legal Ground

Lincoln, Nebr., June 28-(By F. C. Ayres and H. L. Cooper) - Auditor Wm. H. Smith has rejected the \$1,700,000 Douglas county bond issue voted on at the recent primary election, on the grounds that the issue failed to receive the necessary majority. The bonds received a majority of the votes cast on the proposition, but failed to receive a majority of all the votes cast at the election, and as the courts have held in numerous instances that this is necessary, the auditor refused to approve the history and will according-

ly decline to register the bonds. There are about 3500 foreign and domestic corporations doing business in Nebraska, and the corporation tax department of Secretary of State Pool's office has been kept busy for several weeks past re-issuing tax licenses to these corporations. Already more than 1000 have been issued for this year, and great batches of remittances are coming in daily. The domestic corporation tax is due July 1, and after August 1, delinquent companies must pay 15 per cent interest. Foreign corporation tax is

quent after September 1. More than \$100,000 of revenue is annually derived from these taxes. This is the direct result of democratic legislation, the law having been passed during the session of 1909, when the legislature was solidly democratic.

By request of Fire Commissioner W. S. Ridgell, Attorney General Willis E. Reed has handed down an opinion that where a fire inspector finds defective wiring in private residences or public buildings which does not conform to the provisions of the Underwriters code or is not considered safe, he can order the service corporation to shut off the light until the wiring is put in safe condition. The department has just received a letter and copy of an opinion in a case which was appealed from the common pleas court of Scioto county, Ohio, wherein the Fire Marshall law of that state was declared constitutional. The letter also cites the fact that the Indiana law was also recently upheld by the courts. The Ne braska law is similar to those of the above mentioned states, and the fire Commission is at present involved in a suit at Minden and two at Ewing questioning the validity of the Nebraska statutes. The commission is confident of a favorable opinion.

Not since 1897, when President McKinley issued his call to Governor Silas A. Holcomb for the mobilization of the Nebraska National Guard for service in the Spanish American war, has there been such military activity as is now apparent at the state capitol. By the first of July it is expected to have the regiments about complete, well along with the regular drill and other work incident to rounding the men into shape for service in the field.

Why It Costs More to Furnish Telephone Service in a Large Town Than in a Small One

Telephones usually increase in number as a town grows, and the more telephones there are the more opportunities there are for the use of each telephone.

The more calls there are from each telephone the more it costs to operate that telephone and the more wear there is on the equipment.

Also the equipment per telephone is more expensive in larger places. For example, in a town of 10,000 people the more intricate and complicated switchboard that has to be used costs nearly five times as much per subscriber connected as in a town of 1,000 people.

Subscribers in the town of 10,000 people live on an average three times as far from the central office as in the smaller place. Also subscribers move more in large centers, and these moves cost money.

A more exacting grade of service is required in larger places, which increases the operating costs. Again wages, taxes and rents are higher as a town grows larger. Then, too, in larger places we are generally asked to place our wires underground in cables, which is very expensive.

These are some of the reasons why telephone rates cannot be as low in large towns as in small ones.
