

FUR FAIR EXHIBITS

County agricultural agent Seidell calls attention to necessity of saving exhibits

Everyone should be saving exhibits for the State and County Fairs. The County Fair will be held September 27-28-29 and the State Fair, held September 4-9 inclusive. Each represents the most valuable units for the dissemination of agricultural information and knowledge.

Sheaves of grain should be selected at once and placed out of the rain and danger of injury by mice, etc. Straw of good uniform length, and size, well filled, uniform heads of the same variety, and grain free from disease are essential to a good exhibit. They should be bound in uniform bundles and the use of baby ribbon in binding will make the bundle more attractive.

In the selection of threshed grain exhibits use a neat container, in which place grain true to variety type, free from all other varieties of weed, seeds, sticks, dust, etc., and uniform in size, color, and variety characteristics. It is well to have the variety and test per bushel labeled.

With truck crops including potatoes and fruit, judgment must be exercised in the selection of exhibits. Besides variety type and quality, proper packing, uniformity and market desirability are most important. Many exhibitors of potatoes, fruit, etc., have lost out completely because of lack of uniformity and market desirability. It is not the largest apples or the largest potatoes that the market wants.

In the exhibiting of livestock the following things should be considered: All animals should be carefully brushed or curried. The hoofs should be carefully trimmed. Horses should be broken to show well when led at a walk or a trot. They will also appear better if the bridle or halter is attractive. The fleece of sheep should be blocked to give neat appearance. Animals will appear more sleek and make a better impression if they are given a little extra feed and extra care.

These fairs belong to everyone and everyone should boost for them. This is not the place to win a lot of money, but is the place where it is possible to gain a lot of knowledge. Everything pertaining to crops and livestock will be judged on the basis of market demands. Proficient judges will be secured who can explain to those interested, what the market demands in livestock, potatoes, etc., are.

An Ordinance appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the fiscal year ending on the second Monday in August, 1917, and levying the tax for the payment of the GENERAL and INCIDENTAL Expenses of said City, a tax for the support and maintenance of the public LIBRARY of said City a tax for the maintenance and repair of the SEWER system of said City; a tax for the maintenance of the City PARK of said City and taxes to pay the interest and principal upon the water bonds, water extension bonds, light bonds, sewer bonds; and City park bonds of said City; and for the maintenance and repair of street lighting, stationery and printing, fire and water, street and alley, officers' salaries, and for the support and maintenance of the Alliance cemetery.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That there is hereby appropriated out of the money to be raised by tax or otherwise by the City of Alliance, Nebraska, the sum of \$42,000, for the purpose of paying the general and incidental expenses of said City, for the supporting and maintenance of the public library of said City, for maintaining and repairing the sewer system of said City, for paying the annual interest and creating a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the water bonds, water extension bonds, sewer bonds, light bonds, City Hall bonds, and City Park bonds of the said City of Alliance, and the maintenance of the City Park of said city, and for maintaining street lighting, stationery and printing, fire and water, officers' salaries, for the improvement of streets and alleys, for support and maintenance of the Alliance cemetery, in funds as follows:

City Park maintenance, \$1,500; interest City Park bond, \$250; City Hall bonds, \$550; sewer maintenance, \$2,000; lighting bonds, \$1,000; sewer bonds, \$1,600; water extension bonds, \$1,000; water bonds, \$3,000; street and alley lighting, \$4,500; stationery and printing, \$600; fire and water, \$1,000; street and alley, \$10,000; officers' salary, \$6,500; City library, \$2,000; cemetery, \$1,500; total \$42,000.

Section 2. That there is hereby levied a tax of 15 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the payment of the general and incidental expenses of said City.

Section 3. That there is hereby levied a tax of 2 1/2 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of supporting and maintaining a public library in said City.

Section 4. That there is hereby levied a tax of 2 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the maintenance and repair of the sewer system of said City.

Section 5. That there is hereby levied a tax of 1 1/2 mills on each dol-

ka, for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on the water bonds of said City.

Section 6. That there is hereby levied a tax of 6 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of paying the interest and principal on the water extension bonds of said City.

Section 7. That there is hereby levied a tax of 3 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of paying the interest and principal on the sewer bonds of said City.

Section 8. That there is hereby levied a tax of 1 1/2 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on the lighting bonds of said City.

Section 9. That there is hereby levied a tax of 1/2 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on the City Park Bonds of said City.

Section 10. That there is hereby levied a tax of 2 mills on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of supporting and maintaining a public City Park in said City.

Section 11. That there is hereby levied a tax of 1 mill on each dollar of the assessed property valuation of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, for the purpose of supporting and maintaining the Alliance Cemetery.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
