List of Cases Disposed of at the September Term Held at Chadron

The United States District court, district of Nebraska, Chadron division, convened at Chadron for the September 11, 1916, term. On Monday, September 11, 1916, at 9 a. m., Hon. Thomas C. Munger, judge, presiding, also the following court officers were present: Hon. T. S. Allen, U. S. district attorney; R. C. Hoyt, clerk of the court; L. J. Faeger, deputy clerk; Thomas J. Flynn, U. S. marshal; A. M. Wright, and J. B. Dickerson, deputy marshal and chief clerk to U. S. marshal.

Court having been opened in due form of law, by the U. S. marshal, the following proceedings were had and done, to-wit:

Chicago & Northwestern Ry. Co. vs. Crawford Fruit & Produce Co.—By agreement of parties judgment for plaintiff on first cause for \$69.24 and costs of suit by defendant. Cause dismissed as to second cause of action. McLaughlin and Dressler for plaintiff; J. E. Porter for defendant.
Frank E. Hunsaker vs. C. B. & Q. R. Co., damages.—In open court, cause dismissed at costs of defendant both parties consenting. J. L. Westover and M. F. Harrington for plaintiff; Wright & Motheshead for defendant.

Nebraska Potash Works Co. vs. Potash Products Co., damages.—Leave granted plaintiff to file amended reply instanter. Williams & Edmunds for plaintiff; Boyd & Metz and Schrader & Leing for defendant.

Equity Docket
U. S. A. for use and benefit of Foster Lumber Co. vs. United Surety Co., et al.—Cause of action of Foster Lumber Co. dismissed on its motion at its costs, so far as made by them. On stipulation of remaining parties cause transferred to Lincoln division. J. E. Porter for plaintiff; F. A. Brogan for defendant. E. M.

United States vs. Delia A. Aylward, to cancel patent.—Leave granted to parties to take testimony by deposition of witnesses. D. W. Dickenson appointed as commissioner to take such testimony. T. S. Allen, U. S. district attorney for plaintiff.

United States vs. Anna M. Aylward, to cancel patent.—Same as last above cause.

Criminal Docket
United States vs. Isaac N. Dickerson, selling liquor to Indians.—Nolle prosequere entered by leave of court.

United States vs. Harry Jacobs, selling lemon extract to Indians.—Nolle prosequere entered by leave of court.

United States vs. George Boesi, selling liquor to Indians. Dismissed by U. S. attorney.

United States vs. A. Blazer, retailing liquor without having special tax.—Defendant in court with his counsel, arraigned and plead "not guilty." Cause called for trial. Jury empaneled and sworn, 9, 11, 16. Jury returned to court with report of inability to agree upon verdict. Jury discharged from further consideration of case. U. S. district attorney T. S. Allen for U. S.; A. G. Fisher for defendant.

U. S. vs. A. Blazer, selling liquor to Indians.—Defendant in court with his counsel. Arraigned and plead "not guilty." Same counsel as last above.

United States vs. Ward Deon, selling liquor to Indians. Default and forfeiting recognizance. Forfeiture set aside on motion of district attorney. Defendant appears in court. Arraigned and plead "not guilty." Mrs. F. M. B. O'Linn appointed as attorney for defendant.

United States vs. Harry Bear, selling liquor to Indians. Nolle prosequere entered by leave of court.

United States vs. Harry Bear, selling liquor with special tax. Nolle prosequere entered by leave of court.
The case of Nebraska Potash Works Co. vs. Potash Products Co. will in all probability be tried at an adjourned term of court either in January or February, 1917, to be determined by the judges, and at which time a special jury will be

called for that case, as well as for the further trial of the case of U. S. vs. A. Blazer.

LUCKY SENTENCED TO PRISON FOR LIFE

Negro Pleads Guilty to Second Degree Murder—Sentences for Others

A large crowd gathered in the district court room Friday afternoon to witness the sentencing of several prisoners, among whom was Sammy Lucky, the colored man who killed Ed Hayes.

Court was called with Judge Westover on the bench. Lucky entered a plea to second-degree murder and asked for leniency of the court for several reasons, none of which appealed with any great force to the court or to the spectators. The judge imposed a sentence of life imprisonment.

Orville Lewis and Willie Dunbar were sentenced to an indeterminate term of one to ten years in the state prison. They entered pleas of guilty to the charge of robbery of Holsten's drug store some time ago. The court gave them some good advice, which it is hoped they will consider carefully.

James Washington was given an indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years for robbing the Alliance hotel. He pleaded for mercy because he had an aged mother to support, also a wife and child.

Does Prohibition Solve the Crime Problem?

Prohibition has not solved the crime problem in Kansas. The best evidence on this point is found in the First Biennial Report of the State Board of Corrections of Kansas. (The Latest available printed official report.)

We reproduce herewith from page 25 of the Kansas report the list of new prisoners (605) received at the Kansas State Penitentiary during the two-year period ending June 30, 1914, and the character of crimes committed.
