

PERU NORMAL NOTES

Dean E. L. Rouse was in Harvard last week and made an address at the city teachers' institute Friday. The first football game of the season was played Friday with Wesleyan University at University Place. For the first time in many years Wesleyan did not carry off the honors. The game resulted in a 0 to 0 score, and Peru is justly proud of the way in which our men played the game. Spacht has been limping around in a cast of Denver Mud since the game.

The Dramatic Club is trying a new plan by which to determine who shall be admitted to membership. Heretofore applicants were accepted or rejected by a vote of the society without any reference to their dramatic ability. This year each applicant was required to appear in a short sketch before a committee from the club, and the new members were chosen from those who showed ability in this line of work. The club membership is limited to sixty. There were only thirty-five vacancies to fill, and more than sixty people made application.

At the convocation period last Wednesday we were privileged to enjoy a delightful piano recital by Miss Kita Thomas, head of the pianoforte department. Miss Thomas returned this summer from her second year of graduate work in University of Chicago School of Music. During her stay in Chicago she won special recognition as an accompanist, having played studio accompaniments thruout the year for noted singers. She has also had a varied experience in concert work and is well known in eastern Nebraska as one of the best pianists in the state.

Each year several members of the Peru faculty are found in our largest colleges and universities studying along their special lines. Those who are absent this year are Dean Mattie C. Ellis, who is doing graduate work in history in the University of Wisconsin; Prof. F. C. Jean, head of the department of biology, who is working toward his Master's Degree in the University of Nebraska; Mary V. Dick, who will do graduate work in some economics at Columbia University, and Mera McClellan, art critic,

who is doing graduate work in an art school in Kansas City. Prof. Brown was called to Papillion Thursday to organize a study center. A large number of study centers have already been established in this part of the state. Instructors from Peru go to these communities and conduct classes for the benefit of those who cannot attend the Normal.

The Ashbridge bill recently enacted by congress increases the pension of soldiers' widows from \$12 to \$20 per month. Only widows 70 years of age or more, are entitled to this increase of pension. There are quite a large number of soldiers' widows in Alliance and many inquiries have been made regarding the provisions of the new law. Those who have reached the age mentioned will be permitted to draw \$20 per month instead of the \$12 which they have been getting and as fast as the widows under 70 reach that age, they will come under the provisions of the act automatically.

Prohibition and Lower Land Values

The U. S. Government has gathered reliable figures as to the value per acre of Farm Land in every state in the Union.

The Government takes the value of all the lands in a state, the high-priced land and the low-priced land, and then strikes an average.

On Page 36 of the "Monthly Crop Report" for April, 1916, published by authority of the Secretary of Agriculture, is found a comparison of the average value per acre of land with improvements, as follows:

NEBRASKA—Average value per acre, \$76
KANSAS—Average value per acre, \$58

The U. S. Government states officially that the average value per acre of land with improvements is \$18.00 per acre less in Kansas than in Nebraska. On a quarter section this amounts to \$2,880.00.

The soil of Kansas in every way is equal to that of Nebraska. Climatic conditions are the same.

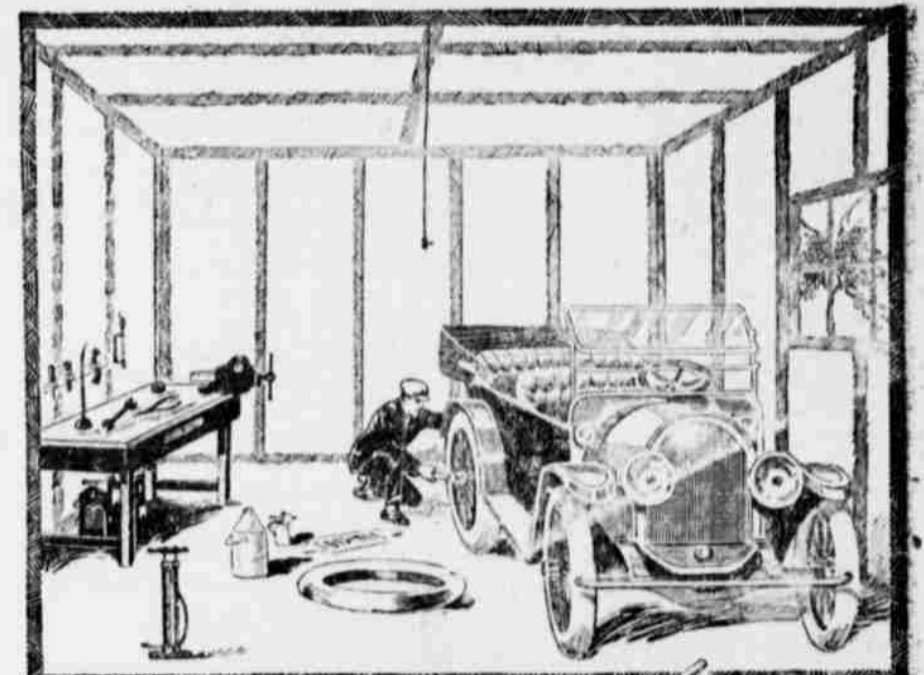
