

A county fair should be held again next year. commercial club took care of a large portion of the work, handled the finances and directed the holding of the fair. The commercial club will pay all the premiums and make up the deficit of \$240 incurred. In addition to that the club expended \$275 on permanent improvements on the fair grounds.
