Hard on Clubs

"It shall be unlawful, and a violation of this act, for any officer, employe or member of any club, society or association, or combination of persons, or for any proprietor, owner, manager, or employe of any horestaurant, rooming house, sel. boarding house, road house, boat, or boat house, or any place of public. entertainment to keep or to aid or abet in keeping, or have in his posseasion, any intoxicating liquor, for the purpose of sale, use or gift as a beverage, or for the division or distribution of the same in any manner whatsoever."

As to liquor advertising, the statof any provision of the act constifirculars, periodicals, hand bills, tutes a misdemeanor, punishable by rice list, sign board, billboard, bul-\$100 fine or imprisonment in the county jall from thirty to ninety days. And woe to the man who fills his suffcase full outside the state and brings it or ships it in to replenish his cellar. For if he does not tell the railroad or the expects company that liquor is therein, he is deemed a law breaker.

Shipments of liquor can't be opened at the station or in transit, nor can they be delivered to minors or, people who give fictitious names, and when delivery is made the receiver must sign an affidavit stating whethor it is for medicinal, scientific, mechanical or sacramental purposes. If the affidavit looks too scientific or religious to the state commissioner, he will investigate.
