Eleven State Officials of the Faith Inducted into Office—Hold Reception

NEVILLE DELIVERS MESSAGE

Governor Says, "We Will Keep Faith With the People," Referring to Amendment

The triumph of Democracy became complete in Nebraska on Thursday, January 4, when eleven state officials, elected on the Democratic ticket were inducted into office.

Keith Neville of North Platte, youngest governor ever seated in the history of Nebraska and the first native son so honored, headed the list. Besides him were Lieutenant Governor Edgar Howard of Columbus, Secretary of State Charles Poole of Hyannis, Attorney General Willis Reed, Auditor William Smith, Railway Commissioner Victor Wilson of Strassburg, Land Commissioner George Hall of Scottsbluffs, Treasurer George Hall of Franklin, State Superintendent W. H. Clemmons of Fremont, Regent P. L. Hall of Lincoln and Regent Harry Landis of Seward.

Chief Justice A. M. Morrissey of the state supreme court administered the oaths of office. The proceedings were short and simple. Members of the legislature in joint session looked on as did hundreds of relatives and friends.

A reception was held Thursday night at which incoming and outgoing state officials were in line and at which the legislative members and their wives were made welcome. The legislature adjourned until Tuesday noon of this week.

Governor Moore's ead, in his valedictory message, urged the continuance of the policy of business economy, establishment of good roads, and use of convict labor on them. He complimented the printing commission and suggested certain regulation; pointed to the necessity for a better capitol building, and urged a shorter ballot. He again urged the selection of the chief justice from the state at large and the associate justices by districts, criticized the primary law, discussed the schools and advocated the teaching of the life and works of Lincoln in the public schools. Conservation of water power, discussion of veto power and new legislation were other features.

Governor Keith Neville in his message to the members of the Thirty-fifth session of the legislature of Nebraska made the following recommendations:

PROHIBITION—"Our duty is obvious; we must keep faith with the people; we must honestly, conscientiously and intelligently endeavor to prohibit the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquor with the state after the amendment becomes effective."

The spirit of the amendment does not propose abridging the rights of the individual save as necessary to prevent the sale and manufacture.

The governor should be authorized to appoint a public welfare board, of men "honest, fearless and capable," to gather information of law violations, assist in prosecutions and determine whether or not local officials are doing their duty.

The attorney general should have power to aid local prosecutors or act as a special prosecutor.

Drug stores should be licensed by the state and strictly regulated.

Shipment into Nebraska of low-grade, injurious liquors should be prohibited.

Drinking clubs and locker systems should be prohibited.

Landlords should be made liable for illegal use of building, as in case of Albert law.

Fine is not sufficient punishment; jail sentence should be provided.

Soliciting of orders by outside manufacturers should be prohibited.

Railroads and express companies should file statements of shipments with county clerks.

PUBLICITY BUREAU—Desirable to advertise great resources and opportunities of Nebraska.

FARM CREDITS—Real estate loan commissions should be regulated not to exceed 2 per cent on loans of less than \$3,000 nor 1 1/2 per cent on those above \$3,000; no commission if interest rate be over 6 per cent. Banks and trust companies should be permitted to invest in federal farm bank loans.

PRIMARY LAW—Should be amended to require nominating petition signed by 1 per cent of total vote on the office concerned, from two-thirds of the counties of state or district; county and legislative offices excepted. No candidate in two party primaries should be permitted to accept minor party nomination unless his vote in that party exceed his vote in major party. No candidate in primary should run by petition if defeated.

SHORT BALLOT—Elect county officers in 1918 for four-year terms; presidential electors nominated by party conventions, names of candidates only to appear on ballot.

SCHOOLS—All school officials should be elected by nonpartisan ballot.

IRRIGATION—State should cooperate with federal government; funds should be provided to defend Nebraska rights in litigation.

NEW CAPITOL—A capitol commission should be created to provide a plan for gradual construction of a new capitol during several years; fund to be raised by tax levy over several years.

NATIONAL GUARD—Care should be taken to maintain and add to efficiency.

SUPREME COURT COMMISSION—Should be continued.

GOOD ROADS—A state road commission should supervise expenditure of funds, in co-operation with federal government, so that all parts of state be benefited. Paved roads not necessary.

WORKINGMEN'S COMPENSATION—Compensation should be more nearly adequate; injured employes should be protected against insolvency of employer.

APPROPRIATIONS—Should be sufficient but not unnecessary or impractical.
