MELLOR IS DEFEATED

State Board of Agriculture Sprung a Surprise-Offered Place on Board of Managers

At the meeting of the state board of agriculture held at the state farm at Lincoln last week W. R. Mellor, for eleven years secretary of the state board of agriculture, was dislaced thru the election of E. R. Dandeison of Polk coun'y. The defeat of Mr. Mellor came as a surprise to Mr. Mellor and his friends, altho Mr. Mellor learned of the contemplated action after the fair managers banquet the previous evening.

The charge made against Mr. Mellor by some of those who were opposing him was that he is dictartorial and that other state fair officers have found it difficult to work in harmony with him. These charges were indignantly denied by Mr. Mel-

On his way home from the fair managers' dinner at the Commercial club in Lincoln Mr. Mellor was informed that a meeting of members of the fair board had been held and that it had been agreed to make a change in the office of secretary. It was suggested, it is understood, that Mr. Mellor step down from the office of secretary gracefully and accept a place on the board of managers. Mr. Mellor would not agree to the program outlined.

Mr. Mellor, while at the meeting of fair managers the night before had marvelled that but few members of the state board of agriculture were present. He learned on the way home that they had been meeting at the Lindell.

Mr. Mellor has served as secretary of the state board for eleven years. His salary now is \$3,000 a year and Mr. Danielson will receive that sum for his services.

The vote by which Mellor was defeated was 42 to 30. Peter Youngers nominated Mr. Mellor and E. R. Purcell of Broken Bow nominated Mr. Danielson.

There are twenty-nine members of he state board. The large vote, 72 votees being cast, is accounted for by the fact that representatives of couny fair associations are allowed a roice in the proceedings of the state board of agriculture.


