## SHOWS NO FAVOR

### Pneumonia Strikes Down the Young and Old Alike—Strictly Cold Weather Ailment

This section has been a surprisingly large number of cases of La Grippe and Pneumonia this winter. Some have the idea that pneumonia is a disease exclusively of the aged, but this belief is erroneous according to Dr. C. F. Chapman, head of the department of health for the city of Lincoln. He presents figures to show that probably one-third of the deaths from this source strike between the ages of ten and fifty years. This strictly cold weather ailment is described as being invariably a germ affliction. The primary cause of pneumonia is said to be generally some other disease or disease. Principal among these is said to be influenza. Dr. Chapman has just issued the following bulletin on pneumonia:

Ten per cent of all the deaths in the United States result from pneumonia. Seventy per cent of all cases occur between December 1 and May 1. It is distinctly a cold weather infection. Pneumonia principally affects those at the extremes of life, but no age is exempt. Oslar has termed pneumonia "the friend of the aged" because its acute and often painless course cuts short symptoms of decay so distressing to the sufferer and his friends.

Not Limited to Age  
On the other hand, pneumonia does not confine its ravages entirely to the aged, but takes every winter a heavy toll of those adults in the age periods of particular usefulness to the community. Of the 36,911 deaths recorded from Lobar pneumonia in the United States registration area for 1914, 12,774 or more than one third of the total number occurred between the ages of ten and fifty years. There exists in man a natural predisposition to pneumonia says Oslar which is marked up to the sixth year of life. The liability up to the fifteenth year of life, after which it again increases with every decade.

Pneumonia is invariably a germ disease. The contagious nature of lobar pneumonia is now well established and it is of importance to know that it must now be added to our already long list of diseases in which a carrier condition exists. Inasmuch as the causative agent may be present in the mouth secretions of a large proportion of healthy individuals. The presence of other diseases is a great predisposing cause of pneumonia. They prepare the soil for invasion. Holding first rank among these diseases is influenza. An increased number of cases of pneumonia usually follows an epidemic of influenza. Individuals who suffer from respiratory diseases are peculiarly susceptible to pneumonia, especially those in advanced years. Measles and whooping cough not infrequently pave the way for pneumonia. Overcrowding, in street cars, theatres and other public places is unquestionably in part responsible for the spread of pneumonia in cities.

### Doctors Fail to Report

Pneumonia as a disease is one if not the most difficult to control from the standpoint of public health service. In the first place, doctors who are very particular to report the more common contagious diseases fail in many instances to report lobar pneumonia. More strict enforcement of the ordinance covering this point is necessary so that further preventive measures can be established. It is most important that the department of health be acquainted with the location of a disease before action can be taken. Modified quarantine should be maintained and it is a question whether or not pneumonia cases should be terminated only after microscopic examination of sputa.
