"When fall came I pulled most of the beets and picked all the tomatoes. I like gardening and intend to enter the gardening club again next year. I took second prize on beets at the fair. I had many visitors. I sold by the basketful \$25 in tomatoes."

EXTENSION MAY BE BUILT NOW

(Continued from page 1 this section) Yutan cutoff of the Burlington was built to give better service on the Burlington between Sioux City, Omaha and Kansas City. The extension of the O'Neill short line to Alliance would have the same effect as concerns Denver, Alliance, Sioux City, St. Paul and Minneapolis, to say nothing of the many towns between and the new country that will be opened up and made to be profitable for the Burlington almost from the start.

Lines Now Parallel One who has not looked into the proposition might not realize the extent of the possibilities of railroad extension in Nebraska. A look at a map of Nebraska will show three main lines of railroads in the state running parallel to each other, leaving a territory of from forty to sixty miles in width with 10 branch lines as feeders to the main lines. This is true from the west line of Buffalo county to the center of Cheyenne county on the south, and west

of Norfolk on the north line. In Custer county there are two branch lines; in Garfield, two; and in Greeley, one branch, all pointed northwest. For some reason these lines have all remained just as they are for years.

Will Be Great Boost The territory through which the proposed road will pass will be benefited to an unfigurable amount by the coming of the railroad, and the railroad will have the exclusive entrance into this rich territory. The business interests of Sioux City, Alliance and all points along the route are hoping that the extension will become a reality in the very near future, but the farmers and ranchmen of the section are no less anxious. The men on the ground know the possibilities of this great territory when the railroad opens it up.

(Continued from page 1 this section) one morning, the machinery of justice would become badly clogged if each had to be tried by a jury. Also, it would be more difficult to secure conviction if the decision rested with a jury.

For Sacramental Purposes Still another clause would allow an Omaha wholesale house to keep on selling wine for sacramental purposes only. This was included upon the request of heads of one of the churches which wished to keep on buying its wines from this concern rather than being forced to go outside the state for them.

It is further provided that, while the enforcement machinery is placed with the governor, this in no sense relieves local and county officers from performing their duty in the matter. With the approval of Governor Neville, a section was added appropriating \$50,000 for the enforcement of the law.
