H the Richmond bill succeeds in getting thru, it will be because the expense is to be distributed thru a series of yearly levies that will make it easy to raise the \$3,000,000 de-The difficulty of guessing which will happen, a new building or a repaired one, lies in the fact that sentiment is not crystalized in either house on the proposition, and some powerful arguments for a new building may sway the sentiment that way.

Aside from the natural disinclination of members to order so large an expenditure as a new capitol will require, there stands the fact that it would cost about a million more right now than in ordinary times. This is used as an argument to postpone the building by some of the members and meet the present exigency by a lot of repairs.
