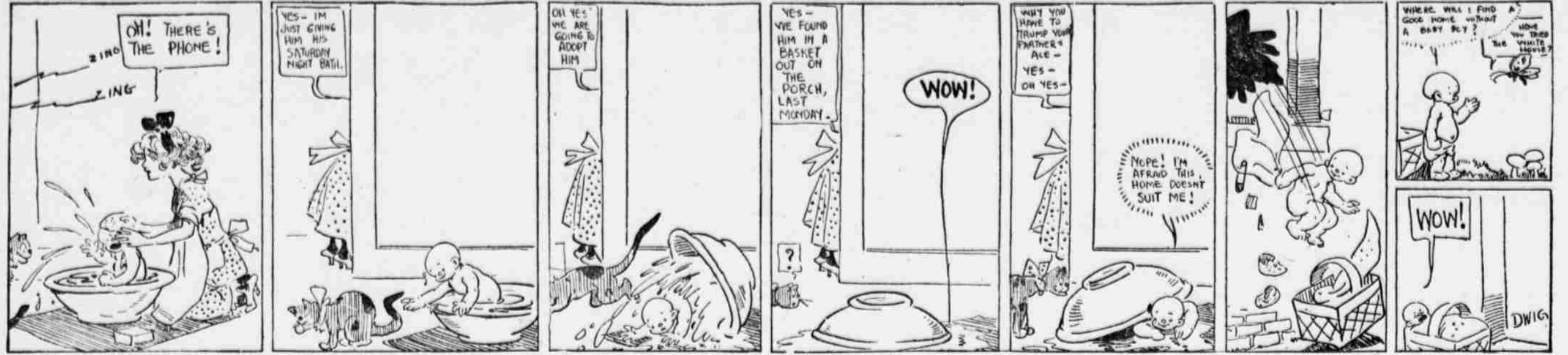

NEW USE IS FOUND FOR COUNTY AGENTS
Work in Nebraska Bearing Fruit in New Form—Aids in Buying and Selling Live Stock

County agent work in Nebraska is bearing fruit in a new form—the cooperative sale of pure-bred live stock. County agent F. M. Seidell of Box Butte county together with all other county agents in Nebraska have been called upon to supply Utah interests with ten car loads of pure-bred bulls and heifers and ten carloads of sows.
Two buyers from Utah have been in Lincoln to purchase hogs which will be sold to boys and girls who take part in the pig raising project conducted by the agricultural extension service of Utah. H. A. Montgomery of the Odegen Packing Co., is one of the buyers who represents packing house interests which are giving the plan financial backing. The other is F. W. Stephens, of Logan, Utah, assistant leader in boys' and girls' club work.
These buyers included in the itinerary of their purchasing trip visits to Seward county and Gage county last week. The purchase of cattle will be deferred until car load lots can be secured, when the county agents will send a representative to close the deal.
This foreign demand is the direct outgrowth of co-operation of Nebraska farmers in county agent work. For some time, farmers associated in county agent work have been purchasing live stock cooperatively, but this is the first big sale they have made this year. Three Nebraska county agents, C. E. Gunnels of Seward, L. Boyd Rist of Gage, A. G. George of Madison, are now in the east purchasing Holstein cattle for their constituents.

A national farm loan association has been organized at Ellsworth and is known as the Ellsworth National Farm Loan Association. A meeting was held at which a large number attended and the organization was perfected with an overflowing membership.
