AGED ALLIANCE MOTHER ANSWERS THE CALL
Death of Mrs. Tabatha D. Miller Occurred Sunday—Funeral Held Monday Afternoon
Mrs. Tabatha D. Miller died Sunday, March 4, at her home in south Alliance following an illness from pneumonia and complications. The funeral was held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at her home, the funeral sermon being preached by Dr. J. B. Carns of the M. E. Church. The remains were taken to Phillips, Neb., Monday night for burial. Deceased was seventy-four years of age at the time of her death.
Tabatha D. Jeffers was born in Harrison county, Ohio on June 3, 1842. On March 2, 1865 she was united in marriage to William Miller at Toledo, Ohio. In June 1879 they moved to Hamilton county, Nebraska where her husband died, December 23, 1895. To this union three chil-

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children were born, being Mrs. Anna Jeffers wife of Chief of Police Charles Jeffers of this city, J. W. Miller and Lottie Miller, the last mentioned died in infancy.

In 1896 the deceased came to Alliance and has made her home here since that time. She was a devoted wife and mother and an exemplary Christian woman. She united with the M. E. Church in Alliance about 15 years ago. Mrs. Miller was a woman greatly loved by all who knew her.

Mrs. Miller had three sisters and three brothers, there being two brothers and two sisters living. They are Mrs. Henry Shufford of Toledo, Ohio; Mrs. Lottie Ward of Osceola, Miss.; and J. B. and J. C. Jeffers of Altoona, Iowa. Besides these she is survived by three grandchildren, Gladys and Vera Jeffers and Herbert Miller.
