ORDINANCE NO. 229

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A SPECIAL TAX ON CERTAIN LOTS AND REAL ESTATE WITHIN THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, BOX BUTTE COUNTY, NEBRASKA, TO COVER THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF SIDEWALKS ABUTTING AND ADJACENT TO SAID LOTS.
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Alliance, Box Butte County, Nebraska:
WHEREAS, it having been adjudged, determined and established by the Mayor and Council of said city sitting as a board of equalization, that the several lots, lands and pieces of real estate hereinafter described, have each been especially benefitted to the full amount herein levied against each of said lots, lands and pieces of real estate respectively, by reason of the sidewalks constructed abutting and adjacent thereto;

THEREFORE, for the purpose of paying the cost of the construction of said sidewalks along abutting and adjacent to said lots. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of Alliance:

Sec. 1.—That for the cost of the construction of sidewalks along abutting and adjacent to the property hereinafter described and within the city of Alliance, Box Butte County, Nebraska, the amount assessed, opposite each of said lots is hereby levied and assessed against the lots, parts of lots and real estate according to the special benefits received by reason of said improvement to said lots and real estate. Section 2.—That one-seventh of the total amount levied and assessed upon each of said lots shall become delinquent within ten days of such levy, one-seventh in one year, one-seventh in two years, one-seventh in three years, one-seventh in four years, one-seventh in five years and one-seventh in six years from the date of the passage of this ordinance. That each of such installments except the first shall draw interest at the rate of 7 per cent per annum from the date of the passage of this ordinance until same shall become delinquent and after the same shall become delinquent the same shall draw 10 per cent per annum until same shall be paid.

Section 3.—That the entire amount of taxes so levied and assessed on any of said lots may be paid by the owner or owners of said lots or the entire pro rata proportion of said taxes on any of said lots may be paid by any person within fifty days of the said levy and thereupon such lots shall be exempt from any lien or charge therefor for the correct amount of such levy so paid.
Section 4.—That this Ordinance

shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

WHEN WILL THE WAR END? TRY THIS ONE FOR SURPRISE

An interesting little problem as going the rounds just now. You are asked the year of your birth, the year of your marriage, your age, and the number of years married. You add them together, divide by two, and you get the year in which the war will end! Here is an example:
Born 1850
Married 1872
Age 67
Years married 45

Added together 3384

What you do is to add the year in which you were born (1850) to your age (67) and that naturally produces 1917; and then the year in which you were married (1872) to the number of years married (45), which also produces 1917. All you have done therefore, is to add together two totals of 1917 and divide them by two.

There is just one snag about this problem. It only works if your birthday and marriage anniversary have already passed for this year. If they are still to come you must reckon your age next birthday, and the number of years you have been married when your next anniversary arrives.

"At the present rate, the Fourth regiment will reach its maximum peace strength in a few days and, on

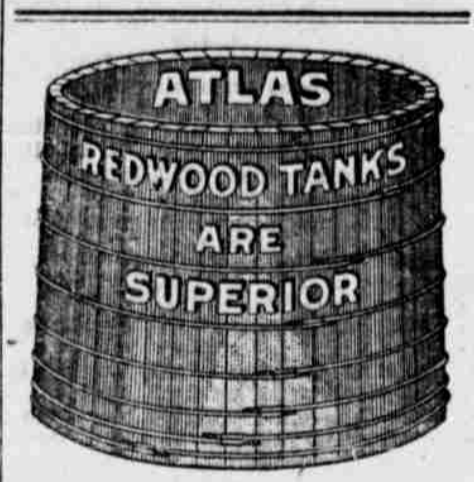
