POTASH LEASES ON STRONG LAKE

This week local people secured a lease on five or six lakes situated in township 24 and ranges 44 and 45, from John F. Strong, father of R. C. Strong of Alliance. The lakes are located midway between Lakeside and Antioch, in the center of the "potash belt."

The Strongs are to receive a royalty on the output of the lakes if the present plans of the parties taking the leases mature and a plant is erected.
