## ONE THREATENED NOT TO REGISTER—CHANGED MIND

## SEVERE HAIL STORM SWEEPS PLATTE VALLEY

Morrill Mail: The Platte Valley experienced its second hail storm Monday at noon, and considerable damage was done to crops along the line. The strip of hail was not very wide, it reaching from Morrill to about two miles south, as we have been informed. North of town it did no damage at all but west, down across the Iowa Flats the storm seemed to be at its worst, and damaged alfalfa and small grain to a considerable extent. In town many windows were broken out and eight or ten globes on the White way were broken. There was practically no wind with the hail here, so it did not do near the damage it would have had the wind been blowing at its usual velocity. All the north lights were broken out on the noon train as it traversed the distance between Morrill and Mitchell. Taken as a whole this storm was not near as bad as it could have been and while crops look a bit sick now, a few days of warm weather will make a wonderful difference.

## SCOTTSBLUFF COUNTY MAN DIES IN ALLIANCE

Gering Courier: The news of the death of William A. Springer, which occurred in a hospital at Alliance early Tuesday morning, was an extreme shock to the many citizens of the county who have known the deceased through the years since pioneer days. Mr. Springer was seized with a severe attack of appendicitis Thursday of last week

and because of its aggravated nature he was taken by special train to Alliance upon the advice of physicians, and while everything possible to medical skill was done the end came as stated. Mr. Springer was one of the most substantial and respected citizens of the valley, having been a resident of Mitchell since the earlier days of settlement, and taken an active part in the affairs of the valley during the developing period. He was a brother of Henry M. Springer now county commissioner, and John M. Springer, now of Springer, Wyo., and for a number of years the brothers did business as a firm, prospecting in the live stock business to a large extent. Of recent years we do not understand that their affairs are a partnership, however. Mr. Springer was a man of sterling character, and his word was as good as his bond. There are few men who stood higher in the community than the deceased and his death will be mourned by many who are in no wise related by the ties of kinship.

## TRIBUTE TO THE LATE CHARLES H. TULLY

Crawford Tribune: Charles H. Tully, a pioneer ranchman of northwest Nebraska died at Alliance on Sunday of heart failure. The following tribute by Henry C. Richmond is a true picture of his life and character.

The daily press Monday carried the news of the death of Charles H. Tully of Alliance, and no one who knew him well has felt a happy moment since. A pioneer of western Nebraska, whose people he best knew and loved he found little time to mingle with the hosts of the more populous eastern section, although men of prominence generally knew Charles Tully, for he was a great soul. Strong, brave and generous, he made no bids for friends. He was one of those nature's noblemen, with a personality to which men were irresistibly drawn. He was incapable of a small thought or a mean act. Men who have ridden the plains and the sandhills with him and accompanied him through the ordinary affairs of life will tell you that Charles H. Tully blest the earth throughout his life with a beautiful consideration for every human creature with whom he came in contact. It was a rare privilege to share the hospitality of his beautiful home and his lovely family. It was a royal treat to traverse the great ranches of the Tully-Musser Land Co., and some of the nation's noted men have testified to delightful hours spent, the

guests of Charlie Tully and his beloved partners and comrades—Logan C. Musser and Herman A. Peters, of Rushville and Hay Springs respectively. It is here, "Out Where the West Begins" as glorified in song and story, that is the real life. The breadth of vision, the loftiness of purpose and the altruistic impulses of such men are educational, refreshing to the mind and exhilarating to the soul.

Charles H. Tully was typical of the very best of Nebraska's great pioneer ranchmen. Hailed as a cattle king, he was as modest as a child, and as tender too. Always unassuming, of affairs, the value of his life cannot be estimated. Now that he is gone, we can only be thankful for what our memory holds of the good things he contributed to the welfare of the world. Politically a royal democrat he was as jealous of the principles which his party upheld as he was of the friendships so dear to him. He was the life of every convention, as he was of every company in which he found himself. He was in every sense a superb type of American manhood, whose sojourn upon earth was correspondingly as fruitful of happiness as his untimely death was unspcakably sad, and in the hearts of countless men, women and children long will abide the sterling name of Chas. H. Tully.

## BOY IS RUN OVER BY DISC—WILL RECOVER

Harrison Sun: Last Friday afternoon, Donald, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Webster, living about nine miles southeast of Harrison, had a narrow escape from death when he was thrown or fell in front of the disc.

His father was running the disc, and Donald was following behind, holding on to the seat. In some manner he was either thrown or fell on the disc and went over in front, the disc passing over him. The parents were not long in getting into town and to the doctor's office, where it was found that he had received a few cuts and bruises, but luckily no bones were broken, and he was not hurt internally, so that he is now getting along all right.

## HOTEL CONSTRUCTION IS BEING PUSHED AT BLUFFS

Scottsbluff Star-Herald: The continued rainy weather of the past several weeks has greatly delayed the construction work on

the part of the two new hotels being erected in this city. The matter of water collecting in the excavation of the new Bluffs hotel at the Sixth and Main streets corner has caused considerable grief and for a time headway against the collection of many rains was attempted with a small centrifugal pump, but this proved too slow and a three-inch centrifugal has been installed, which is a great improvement and has gotten ahead of the water. The forms for the piers are practically all constructed and it is thought that cement work will start in a day or two at least, and with good weather will be pushed.

## BAD WRECK IN YARDS AT CRAWFORD

Crawford Courier: Last Saturday morning about 3:15 an extra 5204 bound west was coming on the down grade from Belmont and just as it got on top of the knoll at Handschiegel Lake, the air, for some reason, failed to work and the entire train of some 73 cars came down the grade and past the depot at the estimated rate of 27-miles per hour, crashing into the derrick at the interlocking place just north of A. P. Howe's fur house, derailing the big mogul and making kindling wood of several of the forward freight cars loaded with coke, T-rails and heavy iron stuff, three or four of the cars piling up in one indescribable mass, and the engine toppling over on its left side where it struck the interlocking switch.

Just before the engine went off the track at the derrick, Engineer Helzel, Fireman Annabel and Head Brake-man Hansen jumped for safety, all being more or less injured, though none of them seriously. The engineer suffered a badly sprained arm and ankle, the fireman severely injuring his right foot, and the brakeman having his right hip put out of commission.

Besides wrecking the engine and a number of cars, and scattering their contents miscellaneous about, a large section of the main track was torn up and many rails broken, the damage running up into thousands of dollars.

The wrecking train came down from Alliance about 6 o'clock in the morning in charge of Superintendent W. D. Weidenhamer, Trainmaster E. G. Gurley and Roadmaster James Emerson, and in conjunction with Yardmaster Gus Hillebrand, began active work in clearing the right of way, but owing to the more than usual damage to the wrecked cars and engine and the torn-up condition of the track the wreckage was not completely cleared away and the yards put back into shape till about 8 o'clock Monday evening.

Luckily the wreck occurred in such a place in the yards that the schedules of the regular trains were not interfered with in the least, all being able to pass thru on track No. 1 on usual time.

## NEW ECONOMY MAIL SERVICE IN EFFECT

Mitchell Index: In line with the economy now being practiced in all departments of the government and recommended for adoption by all others, the mail service on this line has been somewhat abridged. The mail clerk has been taken off of trains 309 and 310 and a "pouch service" substituted instead. This consists of closed sacks to be taken on and thrown off by the express messenger. The receipts at Mitchell on train No. 309 are a sack from the Denver-Alliance train and another for the Alliance-Denver train. On these trains we get nothing from and send nothing to any of the other stations east of here on this line. On 309 we send a sack to Morrill and 310 brings a sack from Morrill.

## SCOTTSBLUFF BALL TEAM DEFEATS ALLIANCE BOYS

Scottsbluff Republican: The Scottsbluff baseball team went to Alliance Tuesday, where they were successful in winning the game by a score of 15 to 7. From all reports the game was not a very exciting one, as the weather was anything but baseball weather.

Our boys went over in automobile, leaving here about 2 o'clock, but did not get to Alliance until nearly 5 o'clock, because the roads were in such bad shape. Owing to the lateness of the hour when they had finished the game, they did not attempt to return home until Wednesday, arriving here about 3 o'clock in the afternoon.
