THE MENACE RENEWED

The later reports show that the submarine menace has again become serious. It was supposed by some that the marked falling off after the record-breaking destruction in April was due to the alleged fact that most of the old slow ships had been sunk and that the new and swifter ships were relatively safe. It was also believed that the British destroyers, ably assisted by American reinforcements, were at last standing the submarines off. It was further suggested that the decreased destruction in May was due to the need, after the big terrorizing drive in April, for the majority of the submarines to return to port for repairs. Whatever the explanation, the highest record for April of 55 ships sunk in a week had declined by the end of May to a weekly record of only 18.

Since then 32 sinkings have been reported for the week ending June 10, a sudden resumption of alarming activity. Moonlight nights and calm seas may have aided, as suggested, yet it is evident that the submarine menace still exists. Fortunately the reports of large arrivals in and sailings from allied ports are encouraging, as are the figures for England's food supply on hand, with four months' sustenance in the crops soon to be harvested, to say nothing of the grain that will reach her shores under any circumstances. Meanwhile Germany is further embarrassed by the power now conferred on the President to prevent the shipment of European neutrals of more grain than they imperatively need for their own use—a provision of the espionage bill certain to alarm Berlin.

LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Choice Beeves Strong, Top \$13.75, Mostly 10c Lower

HOGS SHOW 5-10c DECLINE

Receipts of Sheep and Lambs Very Light and Market Dull—Demand for Good Kinds Very Fair and Prices Quotably Steady to a Shade Lower.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., June 26, 1917.—Cattle receipts were about up to the average for a Monday, 6,000 head, and the quality of the offerings only fair. Choice beeves of all weights were in active demand and strong, some 1,500-pound beeves bringing \$13.75, the highest price ever paid at Omaha for cattle. Medium and common grades as well as cows were generally slow and about a dime lower than last week. Stockers and feeders were very dull, 50¢ to 75¢ lower than a week ago.

Quotations on cattle: Good to choice beeves, \$13.00@13.75; fair to good beeves, \$12.00@12.75; common to fair beeves, \$10.50@11.75; good to choice yearlings, \$12.50@13.35; fair to good yearlings, \$11.75@12.25; common to fair yearlings, \$9.75@11.50; good to choice heifers, \$10.25@11.50; good to choice cows, \$9.75@10.75; fair to good cows, \$8.50@9.50; canners and cutters, \$6.00@8.00; veal calves, \$10.00@14.50; beef bulls, \$9.00@10.50; bologna bulls, \$7.00@8.50; prime feeding steers, \$10.00@11.00; good to choice feeders, \$9.00@10.00; fair to good feeders, \$8.00@9.00; good to choice stockers, \$9.50@10.50; fair to good stockers, \$8.00@9.00; common to fair grades, \$7.00@8.00; stock heifers, \$8.25@10.50; stock cows, \$7.00@10.00; stock calves, \$9.50@11.00. Hogs Mostly 5@10c Lower.

The run of hogs was of fair proportions, about 7,000 head, and with very bearish advices from other points the market was slow and prices 5@10c off. Choice butcher and heavy loads sold as high as \$15.00 and the bulk of the trading was around \$15.00@15.25. Prices were just a shade better than on Monday a week ago.

Sheep and Lambs Steady. Only about 2,000 sheep and lambs were received, an unusually light run for a Monday and the market was slow. Demand from packers was very good for desirable offerings of all kinds, but plain and half fat sort was slow sale at steady to a shade easier figures. Spring lambs brought \$18.65, a steady figure.
