

## MEN WANTED FOR AVIATION CORPS

Orders Received at Alliance Recruiting Station State Need for Skilled Workers

Orders have been received by the members of the recruiting party of the regular army stationed at recruiting headquarters at the Burlington hotel, to enlist men for the aviation corps. The recruits for this service are to be organized into what is known as aero and balloon squadrons which are composed of the following: Aero squadron (service)—Blacksmith, cabinet maker, 26 chauffeurs, 9 clerks, 6 cooks, draftsman, electrician, 8 engine repair men, engine tester, lithographer, 2 machinists, 27 mechanics, metal worker, magneto repair man, motorcycle repair man, propeller maker, 2 photographers, radio man, rigger, 2 sail makers, stenographer, tool maker, vulcanizer, welder, 52 skilled and unskilled laborers.

Aero squadron (repair)—Blacksmith, cabinet maker, 34 chauffeurs, 13 clerks, 6 cooks, motorcycle repair man, 4 packers, photographer, stenographer, 2 stock men, 67 laborers, skilled and unskilled.

Aero squadron (repair)—Blacksmith, boat builder, cabinet maker, 13 chauffeurs, 9 clerks, 6 cooks, 2 draftsman, electricians, 17 engine repair men, 2 engine testers, instrument repair men, 4 machinists, 65 mechanics, 2 metal workers, 2 magneto repair men, 2 motorcycle repair men, 2 moulders, 2 pattern makers, propeller tester, painter, photographer, radio man, tester, saddler and 4 sail makers.

Aero squadron (constructional)—2 buglers, 3 boss carpenters, 51 carpenters, 20 chauffeurs, 8 clerks, 6 cooks, 3 electricians, 48 laborers, 3 painters, 5 plumbers and one truck-

master. Balloon squadron—60 aeronauts, 4 cabinet makers, 68 chauffeurs, 42 clerks, 24 cordage workmen, 10 cooks, 4 draftsmen, 4 electricians, 24 gas works employes, 4 instrument repair men, 8 motorcycle repair men, 16 mechanics, 8 magneto repair men, 8 riggers, 60 sail makers, 56 tailors.

From the above call it will be seen that skilled labor of practically all kinds is needed for the aero and balloon squadrons that are to be organized and young men who have a predilection for this kind of work are now presented with an opportunity that may never come again. A large number of flying machines are being built and active service is assured those who take advantage of the present opportunity to get into these organizations.

## CROWDER INSTRUCTS THE LOCAL BOARD

Tells Board It Must Investigate Interest of Nation, and Never of Individual

Among the instructions received by the Box Butte county board from Provost Marshal General Crowder relating to the selection of men for the draft are the following admonitions: "From every one is demanded a sacrifice. But there is one thought to be kept always in your mind. The selected man offers his life. There is no greater giving than this; and thought should guide you always. There may be a few who will urge upon you claims of exemption or discharge that is made for individual convenience, or to escape personal loss of money or property, or for favor or affection, some other man whose time not otherwise would have come, must incur the risk of losing his life. There can be no room for

hesitation in such a case. "You are not a court for the adjustment of differences between two persons in controversy. You are agents of the government, engaged in selecting men for the government and there is no controversy. You are acting for the government, are to investigate each case in the interests of the nation, and never in the interests of an individual. All are there for the benefit of the nation and to the end that 'the whole nation may be a team in which each man shall play the part for which he is best fitted."

"Therefore, no one has a vested right, by himself or by attorney, to urge, by argument or pleading, his individual case upon you. You should rigidly exclude this." No claimant has a right to submit other proof than that called for by the regulations or than that the board may call for.

The nation needs men, and needs them quickly. The hours will be long and the work absorbing. The duty is to take and never to give, and human nature is such that there will be little praise and some blame. The latter paragraph refers to the board itself.

## COMMENDED FOR THE PROHIBITION BILL

Three Hundred People in Attendance at S. S. Convention in Morrill County Adopt Resolutions

On June 11, 1917, a monster Sunday School rally was held at Nickus Grove, in Morrill county, attended by three hundred people from twelve public school districts in Morrill and Banner counties. At this convention resolutions were adopted commending Governor Neville, the members of the House conference committee on the prohibition bill—Nor-

ton, Thomas and Flansburg — and the members of the Nebraska House and Senate who assisted in passing the Nebraska prohibition law.

These resolutions were received this week by The Herald with the request that they be published. They read as follows:

### Resolutions of Approval to the State Legislature and Governor

At the Sunday school rally, held in June, 1917, on the Lawrence Fork, three hundred people were present representing twelve public school districts in the counties of Banner and Morrill, in Nebraska. This convention unanimously adopted the following resolutions:

First. Be it resolved that this assembly express its most hearty thanks to and its approval of the actions of the members of the Nebraska legislature, both the House and Senate, who last winter stood all four-square for a bone-dry temperance law.

Second. Be it resolved that we gladly honor those members of the conference committee of the House who against all tempting offers and arguments remained unshaken in their determination to carry out the sovereign will of the people, expressed by the large majority vote at the last election for prohibition.

Third. Be it resolved that we most heartily endorse and applaud the manly and statesmanlike action of Governor Neville in insisting that the legislature keep their covenant with the people and enact a satisfactory prohibitory law.

Fourth. Be it resolved that these resolutions be published and copies of the same sent to Governor Neville, the members of the House conference committee, and to the chief clerks of the House and Senate.
