He returns much improved, and says he will be able to go back to work in about a week.

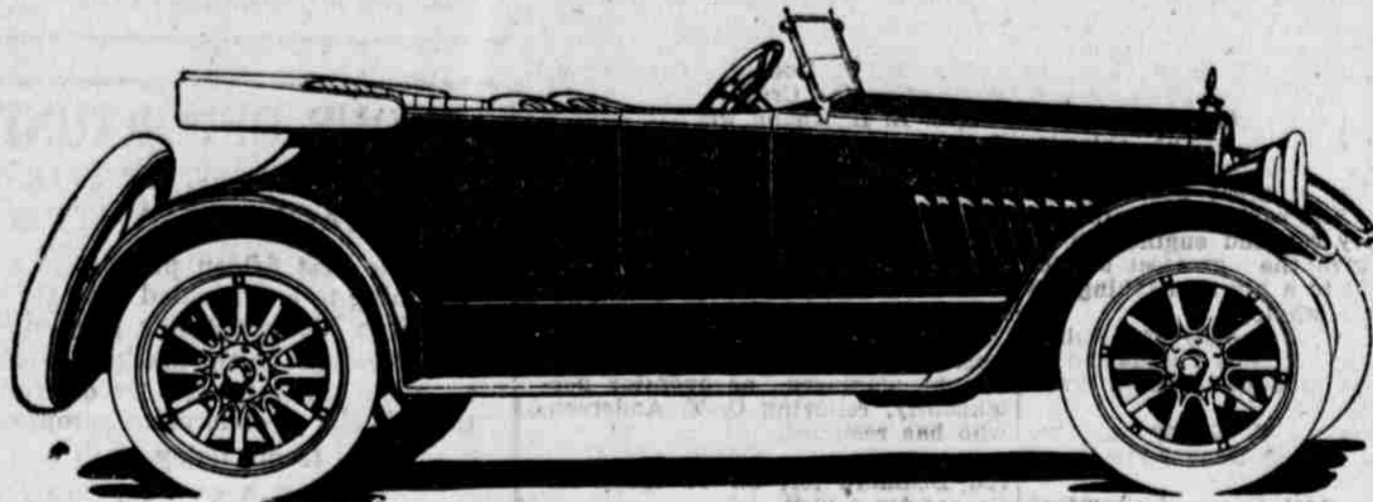
