PRO-GERMANS FORCED TO FAL AMERICAN FLAGS

Kearney, Neb.—A group of German-Americans residing in the vicinity of Pleasanton sallied forth and called on three of their less patriotic neighbors of the same nationality, forced all three to erect the American flag over their homes and pay public homage to it. Judge W. D. Oldham, chairman of the council of defense, was informed of the facts yesterday. There was no demonstration of riot in connection with the visitation of the patriots and none called upon offered resistance. One man, connected with the township school, pleaded that he did not have time to come to Kearney and purchase a large flag. He was promptly furnished one and himself unfurled it to the breeze. There are many German-Americans residing in the vicinity of Pleasanton but the loyalty of none has ever been publicly questioned until this occurrence took place.

COAL AT 5 CENTS PROFIT TO STATE INSTITUTIONS

Lincoln, Neb.—Coal for nine state institutions will be purchased by the board of control from a single Omaha firm during the next eight months, on the basis of 5 cents a ton profit over the mine price fixed by the United States government, plus freight charges and actual cost of delivery.

A contract of that kind was awarded to E. E. Howell & Son of Omaha. The institutions which will receive coal through this firm are the penitentiary, insane hospital and orthopedic hospital in Lincoln, school for the blind at Nebraska City, institute for feeble minded at Harce, soldiers' home and women's industrial home at Milford and the girls' industrial school at Geneva.

It is expected that 20,000 to 25,000 tons of coal will be delivered under the contract, which runs until June 1. The board considers it made an excellent bargain in the purchase of its fuel.
