FIND TUBERCULOSIS IN POULTRY NEAR GENEVA

Lincoln, Neb.—Tuberculosis among chickens and geese raised on the farm of L. A. Hottle, near Geneva, has been definitely established by a post-mortem inspection of 200 of the former and fourteen of the latter which were shipped to Lincoln and killed three days ago under the inspection of the state veterinarian's office.

Twenty-two of the chickens were found to have tuberculosis in its advanced stage while fourteen others were suffering slightly. State veterinarian Anderson believes the disease is more prevalent among poultry than thought.

LIVESTOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Cattle Average About Steady; Trade Excessively Irregular

HOGS SEIL A HAD HIGHER

Supplies of Sheep and Lambs of Moderate Proportions and Demand Active from both Packers and Feeder Buyers.—Prices Range from Steady to a Quarter Higher than Last Week.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Nebraska, October 9, 1917.—Receipts of cattle were not at all heavy for Monday, about 18,000 head, and the market was about steady with the close of last week although unusually uneven and irregular. Range cattle made up the big bulk of the offerings and beef steers, cow stuff and stockers and feeders were all slow sale at steady but very uneven figures.

Hogs Steady to 5c Lower.
The run of hogs was moderate for a Monday, about 2,000 head, and there was a good demand from both packers and shippers at prices that ranged from steady to a nickel lower than Saturday. Tops brought \$19.35 and the bulk of the trading was at \$18.80 @19.50. Compared with a week ago prices were 10@25c lower.

Sheep and Lambs Stronger.
About 18,000 sheep and lambs showed up, not a large Monday's run, and the inquiry from both packers and feeder buyers was broad at prices ranging from strong to as much as a quarter higher than the close of last week. It takes choice killers or feeding lambs to bring \$18.00 and anything above that figure must be fancy.
