HIGHEST AUCTION SALE OF SEASON

The auction sale of R. C. & J. C. Grammore, held at their ranch, fifteen miles south of Bingham on Monday, October 15th, proved to be one of the largest held in western Nebraska in years. Col. H. P. Coursey of Alliance cried the sale and Frank Abegg acted as clerk. Five sections of land were sold to Rentfro Brothers, ranchmen, for \$5.80 per acre, a total of \$18,560. The total receipts from the sale amounted to over \$30,000.

A big crowd attended the sale in spite of the fact that it was a long distance for many of them to go. The Red Cross ladies of Bingham served lunch and were well rewarded by donations of over \$100.

The owners of the property sold were well pleased with the outcome. They give much of the credit for the good attendance to the effective advertising done in The Alliance Herald. Col. Coursey made a record by his quick sales at high prices and he held the attention of his crowd from start to finish.

The former is now a member of the aviation school at Columbus, Ohio, and soon will be dropping commitments on the heads of the Germans in France.

"Nip" writes a very interesting letter. In the letter he says: "I have just completed my work here, have graduated, and will doubtless find myself in France within three weeks. For the past six weeks all the graduates have been sent directly to France or Italy and I am mighty eager to follow them. We have faith in the cause for which we fight and we will never leave the shores of France until we have taught the Huns what it is to be thoroughly and everlastingly whipped."

HOUSE SHORTAGE TO BE REMEDIED

Lincoln Concern Makes Proposition to Build Twenty-Five Houses in Alliance

That Alliance needs more houses is a generally conceded fact. Comes now the Lincoln Hotel Company of Lincoln with a proposition to the Alliance Community Club to build twenty-five or more residences in Alliance.

The proposition is a simple one, easy to understand, and one that seems business-like all the way through, to those who have gone into the matter. It is simply this:

The Lincoln Hotel Company will build twenty-five houses in Alliance, work to be started as soon as ten prospective builders are signed up. The builder must own the lot upon which the residence is to be built and must put up 40 per cent of the cost of the house. The size and kind of house to be built will, in each instance, be determined by the prospective builder. One may want a four-room cottage, another may desire a six-room bungalow, and yet another may be in the market for an eight or ten-room residence. It is all up to the owner.

It is stated that the only limit to the number of houses that may be built is the limit to the number of persons who desire to build and who meet the conditions stipulated. The Lincoln company is a building company and is able to go ahead and start work and rush it to completion whenever the local parties who may be interested are ready to go ahead.

Secretary Fisher, of the Alliance Community Club, took the proposition up with the company and hopes that it can be carried out, realizing that one of the great factors necessary in the advancement of Alliance is more residences.

It is probable that this proposition will be considered at a mass meeting to be called soon to consider a hotel proposition submitted by the same company.
