President of the United States of America.

Proclamation:

It has been the honored custom of our people to turn in the fruitful year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His many mercies to us as a nation. That custom we can follow now, even in the tragedy of a world shaken by war and immeasurable disaster, in sorrow and great peril, because even amidst the darkness that has enveloped us we can see the great blessings God has bestowed upon us, and we are better than mere peace of mind and prosperity of enterprise.

It has been given to our people the opportunity to serve mankind as we once served our country on the day of our Declaration of Independence, by taking up arms against the tyrants that threatened to master and debase men everywhere, and joining with the peoples in demanding for all the nations of the world what we had obtained for ourselves.

On this day of the revelation of our duty, not only to defend our own rights but to defend also the rights of free men throughout the world, there has been inspired in us in full and inspiring measure the resolution and spirit of our fathers.

We have been brought to one mind and purpose. A new vigor of soul and common action has been revealed in us. We should especially in such circumstances, in the midst of the greatest enterprise that has ever entered upon, we have, if we but observe a reasonable economy, abundance with which to supply the needs of those associated with us, as well as our own. A new light shines about us. The great duties which have been laid upon us are made plain to us. We shall never again wonder what stuff we are made of.

As we render thanks for these things, let us pray Almighty God that He will give us the spirit we may look always to Him for guidance; that we may be strengthened in the spirit and purpose of service; that by His grace our minds may be enlarged and our hands strengthened, and that in His good time liberty and peace and the comradeship of a common justice may be established for all the nations of the earth.

Therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the 29th day of November next, as a day of thanksgiving, and invite the people throughout the land to cease upon that day from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to give thanks to God, the great ruler of nations.

Witness my hand and the seal of the office of the President of the United States at the City of Washington, this 7th day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventeen and of the independence of the United States the hundred and forty-second.
