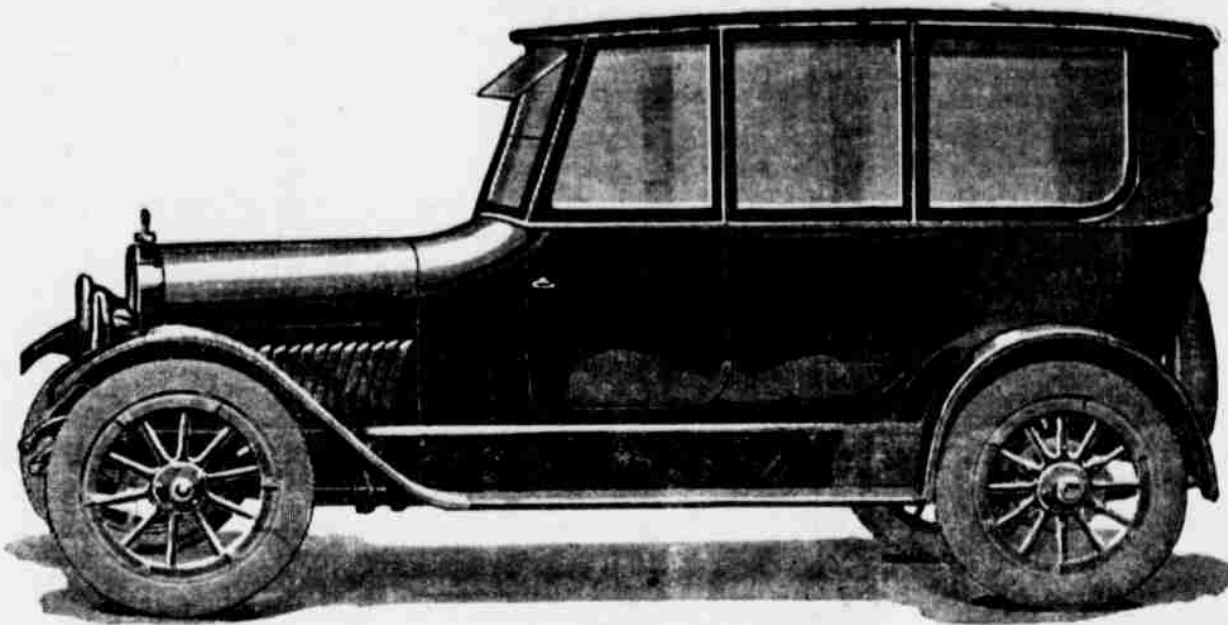

**ECLIPSE PHENOMENON VIEWED BY THOUSANDS**

It passed thru the United States and ended at the Bahama Islands.
