**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION** of the WESTERN PUBLISHING COMPANY. KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, B. M. Thomas, Lloyd C. Thomas and John W. Thomas, citizens of the United States, and residing in the state of Nebraska, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the purposes of the transacting of the business hereinafter described.

**ARTICLE I.**  
The name of this corporation shall be the Western Publishing company.  
**ARTICLE II.**  
(a) The principal place of transacting its business shall be at Alliance, Box Butte county, Nebraska.  
(b) Branch offices may be maintained at such other places in the state of Nebraska as the board of directors may determine where meetings of incorporators, stockholders and directors may be held and all business transacted.  
**ARTICLE III.**  
The purposes for which said corporation is to be formed are as follows: (a) To engage in the printing and publishing business; to own, operate, publish, issue, sell or buy newspapers, magazines or other periodicals; to buy, sell, own and use all manner of office supplies. (b) To own, operate, sell or buy printing plants and printing machinery of any kind or nature. (c) To take, lease, purchase, hire or otherwise acquire and to hold, use, sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, improve and develop real estate, real property and any interest or right therein, and to construct or to have constructed, such houses and buildings as are necessary for carrying on and conducting said business, and to buy, sell, own, use, manage, operate and lease the same or similar structures. (d) To borrow money, with or without security, and for the repayment of the same, to give the obligations of this corporation with any necessary or required security, and to lend money, with or without security, and to do anything whatsoever necessary, useful, desirable, convenient, or auxiliary to any of the purposes of this corporation.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION** to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.  
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:  
Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:  
"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."  
And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:  
"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."  
Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."  
Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

### LIVESTOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Heavy Fun of Cattle and Prices Sead; to 1-15c Low r  
HOGS ARE UNEVENLY HIGHER

Bulk at \$18.35@18.60, With One Load at \$19.30—Sheep Steady to 25c Lower—Feeders Rule Easier in Face of Heavy Run.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., Aug. 27, 1918.—Cattle supplies were heavy, amounting to 15,700 head, made up mostly of western ranglers. Trade was fairly active, but in the face of heavy supplies ruled 10@15c lower, bulk of the killing steers ranging from \$11.00@13.50.

Quotations on cattle: Choice to prime heaves, \$17.00@18.00; good to choice heaves, \$15.00@16.50; fair to good heaves, \$13.50@14.50; common to fair heaves, \$10.00@13.00; good to choice yearlings, \$14.00@16.50; fair to good yearlings, \$11.00@14.00; common to fair yearlings, \$8.00@10.00; good to choice heifers, \$10.00@12.50; good to choice cows, \$10.00@12.10; fair to good cows, \$8.25@9.40; cutters, \$7.65@8.25; canners, \$6.75@7.50; veal calves, \$7.00@13.75; hologna bulls, \$7.00@7.50; beef bulls, \$8.00@12.00; choice to prime feeders, \$13.50@15.50; good to choice feeders, \$10.50@13.00; fair to good feeders, \$9.00@10.25; good to choice stockers, \$10.00@11.50; fair to good stockers, \$8.50@10.00; common to fair grades, \$7.00@8.00; stock heifers, \$7.50@9.00; stock cows, \$7.00@8.00; stock calves, \$7.00@11.00; good to prime grass heaves, \$14.25@16.00; fair to good grass heaves, \$12.00@14.75; common to fair heaves, \$9.50@12.00; Mexican heaves, \$9.00@11.00.

The supply of hogs was light, there being but 47 loads, or 3,300 head on sale. A clearance was made at an early hour, shippers buying their hogs anywhere from \$16.80@19.30, the latter price being the top for the day, and the packers paid from \$18.20@18.45. Bulk of sales ranged from \$18.35@18.60.

There was another heavy run of sheep and lambs Monday morning, estimated at 27,500 head, and early trade on fat lambs was considered steady with last week, best kinds being quotable from \$17.00@17.99; feeder lambs were steady to 25c lower, although a double deck of choice light weights sold to an outsider at \$17.90.
